DIFFERENCES WITH POWER CO.

Prohibitionists Score Premier Ross Who, They Say, Has Bounced Them on Prohibition Issue.

Hamilton, Nov. 19.—At this evening's meeting of the Board of Works a lot of matters that had accumulated were wiped off the slate. Engineer Wingate submitted a report dealing with the differences between himself and the Ontario Power and Electric Light Company, over its lighting contract. According to the engineer the company failed in these things when it adopted the present system of lighting: To place the lights in the centre of the street and to trim the trees to ensure an even distribution of light.

The company has its lights to place before the public, and in order to discover the company's attitude, Mayor Hendrie, Aldermen, Engineer, Aldermen and Solicitor Maclean were appointed a committee to meet the company's representatives and to go over all the disputed matters.

The committee decided not to sign the agreement with the Grand Trunk. The city yard siding, as there is doubt about the ownership.

A bylaw was agreed to whereby citizens may erect fences across their boulevards for their protection.

Prohibitionists Meet.
Less than a dozen temperance workers met to-night at the Y.M.C.A. at the instigation of John A. Nichols of the minor league team in a discussion of that organization.

Seneca Jones was appointed chairman, and he and P. S. Moore, Henry and A. M. Featherstone gave the views of the situation. None of them was altogether complimentary to Premier Ross, who they thought had bounced them on the prohibition issue.

Those present decided to adjourn to await the Privy Council's decision in the Manitoba Prohibition Act appeal. It favors the prohibitionists, another meeting will be held.

Judge Britton Dined.
The members of the Waterloo staff this evening entertained Justice Britton at dinner at the Hamilton Club. E. Martin, K.C., president, was in the chair.

At the High Court.
At the High Court to-day, before Justice Britton, the union label case of Robinson v. McLeod was taken. Henry Carswell, K.C., and Darcy Tate appearing for the plaintiff, Hugh Robinson; and James McLeod (Toronto) and J. H. Bicknell for the defendant, Colin McLeod, merchant tailor, North Main-street.

The action is brought by Hugh Robinson, as agent for the Journeymen Tailors' Union of North America, against the defendant, to restrain him from using union's label, and from offering clothing with the label on or infringing the label, or selling or offering any goods or counterfeited label attached to clothing not made by members of the union. The plaintiff claimed the union label to be a specific trade mark, and was not supposed to be used by persons not members of the union. It was a label of green use to the members, as it, when placed on clothing, gave the public an assurance of first-class workmanship. The defendant, it was alleged, had used an imitation label without authority. The plaintiff, as agent, was the only one authorized to supply the legitimate label to union workers.

The defendant gave a general denial to the affirmations made by the plaintiff. He contends the plaintiff is not the proprietor of the trade mark, and that the Journeymen Tailors' Union has no legal status, it being a fluctuating body unknown to law. Further, the label in question closely resembled other labels and was not particularly that of the Journeymen Tailors' Union of Canada. Defendant also asserted that he had freely employed members of the union and used the union label. He had not knowingly infringed the trade mark of the label.

Considerable evidence was heard, and judgment was reserved.

Hixon v. Wild was taken up this afternoon. In this suit Rev. Dr. Wild, the former pastor of Bond-street Church, Toronto, is defendant, and the plaintiff, Mrs. Hixon, his sister-in-law, who claims the doctor owes her nearly \$500 for work done by her in the hospital.

County Criminal Court.
Judge Spiller presided at Criminal Court to-day, and had several cases before him. Alexander Spence, for stealing \$2 from Thomas Mitchell, was given three months in the house of correction.

Thomas Hensley, charged with stealing \$888 from William O'Brien, elected to be tried before a jury, and his case will come up at the December session.

Alexander Christie was tried on the charge of stealing a coat and hat and two pieces of lace from the Livery Company's warehouse last August. The case occupied the whole day. The prisoner was charged in the store room, and the articles were allowed to be taken by him to oblige the store.

Judge Hall declined to allow an alleged confession by the prisoner to be put in on the ground that it was obtained from Keefe on promise of his getting a better position in the police force.

This afternoon the prisoner was called on his own behalf. He admitted that he had stolen the goods, but he claimed that he was not a thief, and that he was a good man.
