No fall wheat grown, but spring wheat will probably run into a crop of from 25 to 30 bushels per acre. Oats are only of fair promise, tho some districts will have a crop of 30 to 40 bushels. Barley looks well, and, be an average total. The corn was frosted early, and prospects are there-fore poor. Pasture is poor also, and hay, the standby of the French farmer, is only half a crop. Apples are no crop, but potatoes are a good average.

Manitoba.

Southern Manitoba suffers this year very severely from early and continual drought. From Winnipeg to Deloraine the wheat crop will not average more than 12 bushels to the acre, where it harvested 25 bushels last year. Many farmers are summer-fallowing their grain field. Further north and west of this extensive area the conditions are not so unfortunate. In the north the pasture and hay, tho small, are much better, and oats will reap one-half the average crop over the whole province.

The N.W. Territories.
