So little has been realized in the way of practical results with horseless carriages that some people have been inclined to discouragement. But the horseless carriage has evidently come to stay, and is moving east, as the fair announcements show.
At the Rhode Island fair this week there have been twelve entries of horseless carriages, and the races have called out the most intense interest. The unsettled question with the moto-cycle is as to the most successful and cheapest motive power. That the cycle is an established success admits of no doubt. Most of the carriages that have been racing in the Rhode Island fair are driven by gasoline and other motors, but electricity seems in all the trials to demonstrate its superiority.

These motocycles easily make five miles within 20 minutes, and fifteen miles an hour is considered a comfortable speed on the road. It is reasonable to expect that the motocycle will in the future appear more or less in evidence, but to what extent men of ordinary means will be able to own them remains to be seen. As for the horse, of course, he is sure to be in demand in many quarters for years to come.

Conserva e Story of Harcourt's Resignation Denied.

London, Oct. 14.-The St. James' Gazette (Conservative) this afternoon, referring to the reported resignation of Sir William Vernon Harcourt as leader of the Liberal party in the House of Commons, says it may be stated that he has arrived at no hasty decision. He has been dissatisfied at being obliged to seek a Welsh seat, many Liberals rallying to Lord Rosebery's side. Continuing, the St. James' Gazette says that the report of his intended resignation is semi-official. and that, beyond doubt, Sir William Harcourt contemplates a sensational movement.

DENIED. London, Oct. 14.—Sir William Harcourt, replying to an inquiry on the subject today, telegraphs that there is no truth in the report that he has resigned the leadership of the Liberal party in the House of Commons.
