THE FUNERAL

Col. Ingersoll's Remains to be Cremated—Mrs. Ingersoll Taken Ill.

New York, July 25.—Mrs. Ingersoll, who was taken ill yesterday, may not be able to go with the body of her husband, Col. Ingersoll, to the Fresh Pond Cemetery this afternoon. Her condition, however, was improved to-day. The funeral exercises will be begun at 4 o'clock at "Walston, Dobbs' Ferry." The body of Col. Ingersoll having been placed in a plain black cloth covered casket, was removed from the chamber in which he died to the reception hall down stairs today. The coffin was placed in a hearse of floral offerings from friends.

Early Wednesday morning the family will accompany the remains to Fresh Pond, Long Island, where the body will be cremated. They will bring the ashes back to Dobbs' Ferry, and they will be deposited in an urn which will be surmounted with the bust of Col. Ingersoll, to be made from the death-mask made today by John Gray Bernard, the New York sculptor. The only music will be "Siegfried's Funeral March."

DON'T CHEW GRASS

Peculiar Accident to a Toronto Girl—Blood Poisoning the Result.

Toronto, July 25.—Miss Edith Cody, the young daughter of the city treasurer, is suffering as the result of a most peculiar accident. Last Friday she stuck a blade of grass in her mouth in a momentary way, and in a temporary excitement swallowed it. It lodged in her throat, where the saw-like edges lacerated the mucous membrane. Her parents and friends, however, entertained no misgivings until some time after, when a pronounced swelling in her face revealed symptoms of blood poisoning. Miss Cody has always been a strong, robust young lady, however, so her many anxious friends look forward to an early recovery.

An Invertebrate Council.

The City Council, during the progress of the strike, has hardly earned the right to have its august brow wreathed with laurels by the public. If the mayor and aldermen at the beginning had shown a little backbone—had come down flat-footed, and said to both the Company and the men: "This is a matter that concerns the public, and as the representatives of the public, we demand that you come together and settle your differences, by consultation or arbitration"—if the Council had laid down such an ultimatum, neither side could have ignored it, and the city would have been spared these two months of inconvenience and bitterness, and the ridicule and expense incurred through the silly bringing in of outside militia. Instead of this, the Council has been executing a kind of sword dance—trying to hop all around the question without touching it. This shilly-shallying performance would be diverting if the situation had not its serious side. The very aldermen who used to blow out their cheeks in denunciation of the Company, at the ward meetings, are now as meek as lambs, and when the subject of the strike happens to be thrust upon them, look for a hole into which to crawl away from it. Only two or three have had the moral cour-

age to speak their minds—the remain-

der are glad of any subterfuge to escape a plain, honest expression of opinion or evade decisive action.

The Company must be laughing in their collective sleeve at the way in which their game is being played for them by the City Council. The Company have been running cars just as they please. The resolution of the City Council, ordering a complete service dating from July 19, had not the slightest effect because the Company knew by experience that the Council had not the slightest intention of enforcing it. The aldermen have been exceedingly careful not to inconvenience the Company in this respect, lest the latter should be put in danger of forfeiting their charter. The Company appreciate the kindness, but the public do not. The majority of the aldermen have continued to shuffle along like this:

Afraid to favor the men.
 Afraid to favor the Company.
 Afraid to make the Company conform to the charter.
 Afraid not to order the Company to conform to the charter.
 Afraid to hold a police investigation.
 Afraid to prevent a police investigation.
 Afraid to do nothing.
 Afraid to do something.

The Hague, July 25.—The final act

embodying the results of the international peace conference, after enumerating the names and qualifications of all the delegates, says:

"In a series of meetings in which the above delegates participated, inspired throughout by the desire to realize in the highest possible measure the generous views of its august initiator, the conference has drawn up for the approval of the respective governments the series of conventions and declarations appended:

"Convention for the pacific settlement of international disputes. Concerning the laws and customs of war on land. Convention for the prohibition of laws against the use of asphyxiating or deleterious gases from balloon projectiles, and for the prohibition of the use of bullets that easily expand in the human body."

The final act contains five expressions of opinion, as follows:

"The conference considers that limitations of the military charges, which at present oppress the world, are greatly to be desired for the increase of the material and moral welfare of mankind."

"The conference expresses the opinion that the question of the rights and duties of neutrals should be inscribed on the programme of a conference to be held at an early date."

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
