Her condition, however, was improved to-day. The funeral exercises will be begun at 4 o'clock at "Walston," Dobb's Ferry. The body of Col. In-gersoll having been placed in a plain black cloth covered casket, was removed from the chamber in which he died to the reception hall down stairs today. The coffin was placed in a bower of floral offerings from

Early Wednesday morning the family will accompany the remains to Fresh Pond, Long Island, where the body will be cremated. They will bring the ashes back to Dobb's Ferry, and they will be deposited in an urn which will be surmounted with the bust of Col. Ingersoll, to be made from the death-mask made today by John Gray Bernard, the New York sculptor. The only music will be "Siegfried's Funeral March."

### An Invertebrate Council.

The City Council, during the progress of the strike, has hardly earned the right to have its august brow wreathed with laurels by the public. If the mayor and aldermen at the beginning had shown a little back-bonehad come down flat-footed, and said to both the Company and the men: "This is a matter that concerns the public, and as the representatives of the public, we demand that you come together and settle your differences, by consultation or arbitration"-if the Council had laid down such an ultimatum, neither side could have ignored it, and the city would have been spared these two months of inconvenience and bitterness, and the ridicule and expense incurred through the silly bringing in of outside militia. Instead of this, the Council has been executing a kind of sword dance-trying to hop all around the question without touching it. This shilly-shallying performance would be diverting if the situation had not its serious side. The very aldermen who used to blow out their cheeks in denunciation of the Company, at the ward meetings, are now as meek as lambs, and when the subject of the strike happens to be thrust upon them, look for a hole into which to crawl away from it. Only two or three have had the moral cour-

age to speak their minds-the remainder are glad of any subterfuge to escape a plain, honest expression of

opinion or evade decisive action. The Company must be laughing in their collective sleeve at the way in which their game is being played for them by the City Council. The Company have been running cars just as they please. The resolution of the City Council, ordering a complete service dating from July 19, had not the slightest effect because the Company knew by experience that the Council had not the slightest intention of enforcing it. The aldermen have been exceedingly careful not to inconvenience the Company in this respect, lest the latter should be put in danger of forfeiting their charter. The Company appreciate the kindness, but the public do not. The majority of the aldermen have continued to shuffle along like

# Peacemakers' Work

Forms of Agreement Prepared | prombit the dumdum bullet was beat The Hague

For Submission to the Different Governments.

President Kruger and the Volksraad Are Out.

Oom Paul Is Reported to Have Resigned. Date of the Dreyfus' Trial Fixed-

Joseph Chamberlain on the Newfoundland Trouble. The Hague, July 25.-The final act embodying the results of the international peace conference, after enumer-

ating the names and qualifications of all the delegates, says: "In a series of meetings in which the above delegates participated, inspired throughout by the desire to realize in the highest possible measure the generous views of its august initiator, the conference has drawn up for the approval of the respective governments the series of conventions and deciara-

tions appended: "Convention for the pacific settle ment of international disputes. Concerning the laws and customs of war on land. Convention for the adoption of laws against the use of asphyxiating or deleterious gases from balloon projectiles, and for the prohibition of the use of bullets that easily expand in the

human body." The final act contains five expressions

of opinion, as follows: "The conference considers that limitations of the military charges, which at present oppress the world, are greatly to be desired for the increase of the material and moral welfare of mankind. The conference expresses the opinion that the question of the rights and duties of neutrals should be inscribed on the programme of a conference to be held at an early date. The conference expresses the opinion that questions relative to the type and caliber of rifles and naval artillery, as examined by it, should be the subject of study by the different governments, with a view to arriving at a uniform solution by a future conference. The conference expresses the wish that an early convention be called to revise the Geneva convention. The conference has resolved that questions relating to the inviolability of private property in war on land and the bombardment of towns and villages in naval war, be reserved

for future conferences." The convention is signed by all the plenary delegates.

"DUTY" OR "OBLIGATION." The delegates met in the afternoon and examined the text of the final act in order to decide how reservations are to be made. It was decided that not only the three conventions, but the declarations, must be separately signed. The American delegates asked that the word "duty" in article 27 be fully defined, so that the word may in no European affairs, or vice versa. The discussion lasted several hours. Arrangements have been made to find a suitable word to substitute for the word "duty," which will meet the wishes of the American delegates without altering the spirit of the article.

THE DUMDUM BULLET. A Washington telegram says: The United States will not be bound by the reported decision of The Hague conference to prohibit the use of the dumdum bullet in warfare. So far the United States have not been obliged to resort to the use of this bullet, but the ord-nance officers have been making experiments to secure an increased "stop-ping" effect for the small caliber ball used in the Krag-Jorgensen, and these experiments have proceeded somewhat on the lines of the dumdum bullet. He attended the meetings of the Raad this afternoon, during the consideration of his letter. It is not yet known whether his resignation was conditional. The news was kept a se-

The Times publishes a like state-ment from its Johannesburg correspondent identical to that telegraphed by the representative of the Standard, and says the information came from an apparently trustworthy source. The Daily Telegraph's Pretoria correspondent says: "There is no likell-hood of the president's resignation,

which is not desired at the present moment in the interests of either the Uitlanders or Transvaalers." CONFIRMED Cape Town, July 25.-Advices have been received here confirming the report that President Kruger, of the South African republic, has resigned.

NEWFOUNDLAND AFFAIRS. Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, the secretary of state for the colonies, replying to a question in the House of Commons, said he did not expect to be able to make a statement before the close of the session on the subject of the question dividing Great Britain and France with regard to Newfoundland. As to the modus viendi expiring the present year, Mr. Chamberlain said there would be time to obtain the necessary colonial legis-lation before the next fishing season.
