It is no wonder that St. Thomas feels sore. For the sake of the game next year, the Londons should have shown better sense.

A ROAST ON ST. THOMAS.
Hamilton Times: The "dirtiest kind of conspiracy" talk is a nightmare. The St. Thomas club management has done the only and all the dirty work of the year. They deliberately ran away from their engagement in Hamilton on Sept. 6 for fear of being licked, and they sneaked a fake judgment in St. Thomas on Sept. 14, when the Hamilton club was delayed by a late train, and could not reach the grounds in time. Yesterday they tried to run away from an engagement with London, and would likely have succeeded had not the London management promptly obtained a ruling from the league president. On the principle that people who live in glass houses should not throw stones, the St. Thomas baseball people should not say a word about "dirty conspiracy." Another point the Saints would do well to remember is that if they should succeed in having two victories by Hamilton thrown out Hamilton will still be ahead. THE CURVE.

TRADES CONGRESS

Held a Most Successful Session—Dominion Platform.

No Out in Railway Men's Wages—Assertion in Pittsburgh.

Winnipeg, Sept. 22.—The Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, just closed, was the most successful session in its history. The following planks were adopted as the Dominion platform:

1. Free compulsory education and free text-books.
2. Legal working day of eight hours and six days a week.
3. Government inspection of industries.
4. Abolition of the contract system on all public works.
5. A minimum living wage, based on local conditions.
6. Public ownership of all franchises, such as railways, telegraphs, water-works, lighting, etc.
7. Reform by lessening taxation on industry and increasing it on land values.
8. Abolition of the Dominion Senate.
9. Exclusion of Chinamen and Japanese.
10. The union label on all manufactured goods and on all government and municipal supplies.
11. Abolition of child labor by children under 14 years of age, and the abolition of female labor in all branches of industrial life, such as mines, workshops, factories, etc., where it is brought in direct competition with manual labor.
12. Abolition of property qualification for all public offices.
13. Compulsory arbitration of labor disputes.
14. Proportional electoral representation.
15. The prohibition of the sale of prison-made goods and supplies.

NO CUT IN WAGES.
The statement of a Hamilton evening paper that a cut of ten per cent in wages was about to be made by the T. H. and B. Railway management, is entirely false, nor is a change in the management of the road probable. It was further stated that the T. H. and B. officers that the road's freight and passenger business showed a steady increase every month.

CONDUCTORS AND BRAKEMEN.
The Pittsburgh Post says that for some time past rumors of a big railroad strike have been circulated, but nothing definite could be learned until yesterday, when it developed that the conductors and brakemen of the roads entering Pittsburgh want to be placed on an equality with their brethren in other parts of the country. The two branches of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen presented to the officials of all railroads entering Pittsburgh a scale of wages. An answer is requested within 30 days. The demand calls for a ten-hour day, with extra for every hour put in beyond that.

THE FIREMEN

Decide That \$1,500 Shall Be the Maximum Insurance.

Toronto, Sept. 22.—The Brotherhood of Locomotive firemen decided to retain the limit of the insurance as its present figure of \$1,500. JAPAN MISSIONS

Dealt With by the Methodist General Conference.

Rev. John Scott To Be President—Members of the Board Elected.

Toronto, Sept. 22.—The Methodist general conference resumed its consideration of the missions in Japan yesterday. It was decided that the superintendent to be appointed in any foreign mission field should supervise the entire evangelistic and educational work, and should also officiate as treasurer and corresponding secretary in that foreign field. The duties of the superintendent were defined that in general he should lead and direct the work of the mission so as to build up the church of the discipline and work under its care. As it was considered possible that the powers thus given the superintendent might lead to a conflict of authority between him and the president of the annual conference, a clause stating the superior authority of the latter was adopted. The constitution of the mission conference in the foreign field shall not in any way interfere with the administration of the general board of missions, only when authorized so to do by the general board. The limit for the location of a native pastor in Japan was placed at seven years, the last two years of which would be an extension carried by a three-fourths vote of the stationing committee.

Respecting the Woman's Missionary Society, its mission council shall meet in joint session with the council of the General Missionary Society at least once in a year for consultation on matters of common interest. When a missionary, transferred to a mission conference in a foreign field, returns permanently to the home work, he shall be received and stationed by the conference from which he was sent unless the general superintendent decides otherwise.

Rev. John Scott, principal of the Methodist college at Tokyo, Japan, was unanimously appointed superintendent of the Japan mission.

The following members of the missionary board were elected by ballot, the rest of the board being ex-officio members: Revs. T. G. Williams, S. F. Huestis, Dr. Ryckman, Dr. Briggs, Dr. Wakefield, Leo Geatz and Messrs. J. J. MacLaren, G. A. Cox, W. F. Hall, J. A. M. Aikens, A. Shaw and J. T. Moore.

Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent, was elected delegate to the ecumenical council, which meets in England in 1901.

Before conference adjourned last night, Rev. F. W. Wilson, of Hamilton, presented Rev. F. W. Betts, of New Westminster, B. C., with a purse of \$500, contributed by members of the conference and others, on account of his personal losses in the recent disastrous fire.
