#### Foy Denies It.

"The statement is entirely untrue," said Hon. J. J. Foy, acting premier when informed last night of the purport of Mr. Dickson's charges. "Did you not see the members of the

syndicate at all?" he was asked. "Oh, yes, we saw them, as I said in my written statement. We heard representations from the syndicate as well as from the commission."

The references to the proposed withdrawal of the old tender, the readvertisement and the terms on which the syndicate were to be allotted the concession in any event were then read to Mr. Foy in Mr. Dickson's words, to

"Then you deny the statement as to the \$10,000 advance?" "Yes," replied Hon. Mr. Matheson. The Government never agreed to accept the tender of the Ottawa syndicate in preference to a higher tender. There was no such agreement, and such a statement is entirely untrue. It was wholly a case whether there should be
