EDUCATION AND TUBERCULOSIS That the spread of tuberculosis is

largely due to the ignorance and consequent indifference of the general public to the terrible nature of the disease, and the possibility of its being checked, if not, indeed, eventually stamped out, is every day becoming more evident. True, the subject has been of absorbing interest in all great medical councils, and of particular prominence of late years in the medical press. The attention of philanthropic bodies has also been aroused but the great mass of the public remains oblivious, apparently, to the one week, recently, no less than 473 cases of this infectious disease were reported to have developed, while some 200 deaths from the same scourge were these facts was compressed in most of the daily papers within a very small space and with insignificant headlines. Had the disease been smallpox, for instance, the great city would have been tremendously excited. Rigid sanitary precautions, quarantine regulations, disinfecting methods and all the known precautions against a further spread of the pestilence would have been

The cause of the public apathy in the one case is evidently due to the fact that tuberculosis, while unquestionably infectious, is not popularly recognized as an epidemic disease. It is regarded as one of the incidental ills which, though serious, are more or less inevitable, and at the same time incurable and non-preventible. Consequently, a week's record, such as that in New York, causes little or no commotion. Nevertheless, the educational campaign in the prevention of the disease is making marked headway against the old idea that consumption can be neither prevented nor cured, medical men agreeing that by such a campaign the "white plague" can be most effectively combated. A few days ago an exhibition was opened at Pittsburg, Pa., and is now in progress, being undertaken in the belief that the best method of prevention is the education of the public. That the spread of consumption can be limited by proper modes of living, by commonsense application of scientific principles of easy demonstration and comprehension, there can be no doubt. Once the
