Citizens Did Best To Make Fighting Men Feel at Home, But Stay Was Brief.

Labor Day groups stood about the sidewalks at noon yesterday discussing the war. There was not much stirring, and most people were storing up energy and sunshine against the coming of a hard winter.

Then the notes of a tune from a brass band came through the air. It was a band that sent forth volume and melody stronger than any local band since the ranks of musicians have been so much decimated by the war.

People looked toward Richmond street. Suddenly a formation of men in khaki swung round the corner onto Dundas street. Most men thought a party of returned soldiers was being escorted home.

But there was something distinctive, something different, about these men from the thousands of Canadians who have paraded the familiar streets of this town on route marches, on ceremonial parades, going overseas and coming back in more irregular order.

The parade of the first two companies was followed by a second route march through the principal streets of the other two companies, which reached the city a short time after the first section. Two trains of fourteen coaches brought the Sammies to London.
