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GRANDTRUNK SALTYAN ONLY ONE VOTE IN DEFENCE OF ONE BIG UNION

Trades and Labor Congress Adopts Report Denouncing That Body.

F. OF L. INTOLERANT

Winnipeg Delegate Says O. B. U. Not Started by Intolerance of Leaders.

HAMILTON, Sept. 25.—The report of the executive council denouncing the One Big Union was under consideraion at this evening's session of the Trades and Labor Congress here. Regarding the organization the report submitted for ratification said: "The futility of the One Big Union methods should have been apparent from the beginning, founded as it was on force

beginning, founded as it was on force and intolerance of the chosen leaders of the labor movement, repudiating the organizations from which they drew their financial and numerical strength, preaching class hatred throughout the country and gambling their whole future on the success of the sympathetic and national strikes."

Delegate Brody, Vancouver, disagreed with the report. The mind of labor today, he said, was not set on the present form of organization. He declared that the worker could not afford to use the old kid gloves with the employers that were used in the past. The workers were fighting for the principle of collective bargaining, not for the overthrow of constitutional government. "And that might be a good thing, too," he added.

"The One Big Union did not spring into existence as the result of intolerance of a few chosen leaders," declared George Armstrong of Winnipeg. "The very mention of the One Big Union would bring a cheer from the workers in Winnipeg. If there is any intolerance in the Canadian West, it is the intolerance of the American Federation of Labor, for the progress of present day events."

Vice-President Rees announced that he would vote for acceptance of the report of the executive. He said he was opposed to the One Big Union, but in favor of united big organizations. He advocated the merging of existing organizations instead of trying to tear them down.

J. W. Wilkinson of Vancouver, chairman of the officers' report committee, declared that there had been a deliberate attempt to wreck the finances of the international movement to the benefit of the One Big Union. Referring to the principles under which it was carried on, he said he had never been able to obtain a clear enunciation of them. GENERAL STRIKE URGED TO FORCE ORDER'S REPEAL

Labor Congress Delegates Object to Ban On Seditious Literature.

HAMILTON, Sept. 25.—Declaring that a new era had dawned for the laboring classes all over the world, that workers would no longer be conthat workers would no longer be content to exist under conditions that prevailed before the war, and asserting that there was no limits to the possibilities of the labor movement, Ben Tillett, Labor M.P. for North Salford and fraternal delegate from the British Trades Union Congress, aroused the delegates to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress to a high pitch of enthusiasm in an address at this morning's session. pitch of enthusiasm in an address at this morning's session.

Mr. Tillett reviewed the progress of the trades union movement in Great Britain, declaring that organized effort had done more to secure better working conditions than all the talk of revolution prevalent during the last 30 years. The speaker embodied in his address


"As soon as we can obliterate the memories of the war the better it will be for the working class," he said.
