ALL NEW READY FOR DRIVE FOR \$8,000 FOR UNITED WELFARE

At the general meeting of the United Welfare Fund Association at the Tecumseh House on Saturday afternoon, George Reid presiding, representatives of all the organizations to benefit by the campaign, this week were present. The committee, which was organized to raise the \$8,000, reviewed the work of the committee, and stated that the original budget of the various organizations had aggregated \$376,000, more than the amount raised in the biggest campaign during the year, without difficulty this total had been cut down to \$100,000, which amount was reinforced by the entire association as the objective to be attained by this week's campaign.

Mr. Reid announced that his personal canvass of some of the larger contributors had met with generous response. It was pointed out that this was the only campaign of the year, and contributors were urged to make their contributions as large as possible, spreading the payments out over the entire year. W. R. Venable, Gerald Pearson, F. D. Jarvis, John Bridge and other members of the Welfare organization also spoke. Mr. Pearson reported that the special list committee had received some very generous subscriptions, which will be announced in the days to come. Mr. Bridge reported that the team organizations had been completed and that the Commercial Travelers' Association at a special meeting held earlier in the afternoon had made all arrangements for its members to cover the city thoroughly in a house-to-house canvass at the coming week-end.

A Daily Dinner.
The campaign organization and team members will meet at dinner in the Tecumseh House each evening of the campaign. Tonight's dinner was given by George M. Reid, who will be the host, Tuesday evening, Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore, and Wednesday evening, Philip Pocock. The host for Thursday evening's dinner has asked that his name be not announced.

Mr. Jarvis reported that a generous response was expected to the appeal to employees of large industrial concerns to give each one day's pay to the fund.

SAYS MILLIONS WILL LIVE TO SEE SECOND COMING OF CHRIST

Speaker From Hamilton Declares Death Will Then Be Eliminated.

Addressing a crowd which, in spite of the street car strike, filled Hyman Hall to its capacity on Sunday afternoon, E. Whelpton of the International Brotherhood of Students, Hamilton, said that there millions living on the earth at the present time who would never die. He based his assertion on an interpretation of prophecies made by Jesus Christ during his sojourn on earth.

The speaker said that he did not mean that they would be caught up and transported to a place called heaven, but that death would be done away with and the world would be a new world, with the theory of the destruction of the earth with fire.

This unrest which prevailed throughout the world was the sign of the coming of Christ and the establishment of his kingdom on the earth. This, Mr. Whelpton said, was prophesied by Christ himself when he talked to his disciples after they had asked what the signs would be. They were also prophesied in the twelfth chapter of Daniel.

The speaker said he did not claim that the world would be destroyed immediately, but he firmly believed that millions of people living at the present time would see the coming of Christ within the next fifty years. The turmoil and strife one saw on every hand would in all probability become worse until men would fear greatly for the future.

He ridiculed the belief that heaven was a place to which the soul was transported by a quick journey on the instant of death, or that the soul hovered near to the earth. Death was a thing absolute, conquered only by Christ, through his death. Death, a sentence passed upon humanity by God because of the sin of Adam, would be lived out, and in the near future the world would pass out of its power. Christ died to save every man from the curse, and he had the power to restore life.

WORK IS PLENTIFUL

Employment Bureau Reports Fifty Vacancies Here.

Despite a few cigar factories laying off hands, there is plenty of work available in London, the Ontario Employment Bureau reports. The bureau has a list of about 50 positions for which men are wanted in London, and the openings represent considerable variety. Fifty rubber-workers are wanted at Kitchen. St. Thomas, and Galt manufacturers are also asking for help, and the local bureau had many calls from Windsor, but these will probably be filled through lack of men in Windsor, where the automobile factories are cutting down hours of work. Any number of farm workers can be placed by the London bureau.

VETS WANT MORE PAY

Men in Hospital Say Rate is Totally Inadequate.

Great dissatisfaction has been expressed by the men of the Speedwell Hospital at Guelph over the pay and allowances. They claim they cannot live on the money which is being paid them. The amount they receive is the same as their overseas pay, \$1.10 a day. The main cause of their dissatisfaction is that none of them have not overseas service. This scale of pay was authorized by the government in an act recently passed through the houses, in which the veterans were not mentioned. A resolution will be sent to the local branch of the G. W. V. A., asking that the men who are in hospital be paid according to the high cost of living, and not the old overseas rate.

Mr. Reid reported that attention had been called to a considerable amount of work done by the Great War Veterans' Association among its members, and that some of the members were able to secure some assistance from the fund if necessary. Provision for this had been made, Mr. Reid pointed out, by the apportioning of a part of the fund for contingencies.

Shortages and other emergencies, as well as advertising expenses, will be cared for from the contingency fund, and the executive committee has power to make grants to other associations requiring assistance in their welfare work.

A mechanic motored up from Toronto early Sunday morning to repair the engine, which took off at noon Sunday day without further trouble. The officers were taking the machine home to no commercial flying.

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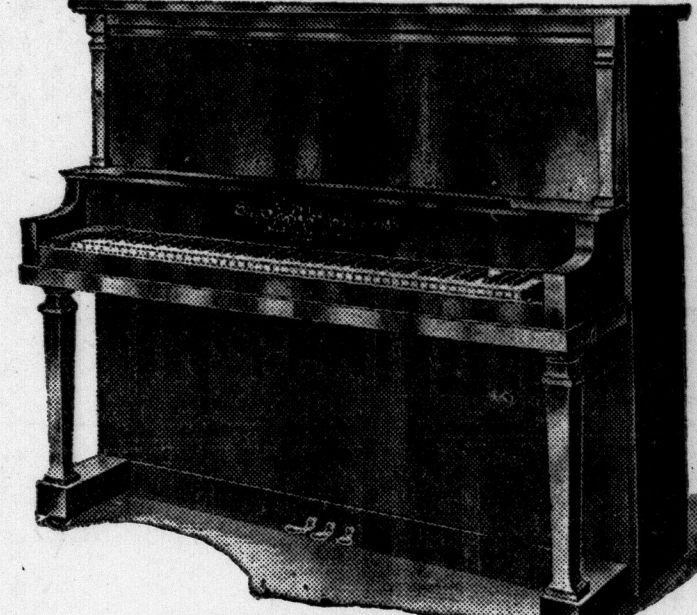
