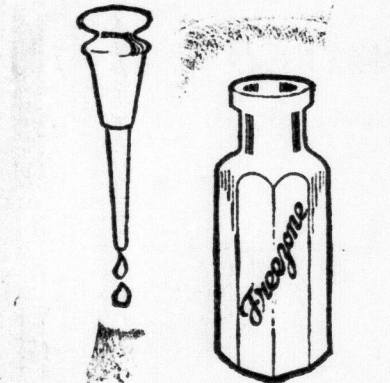

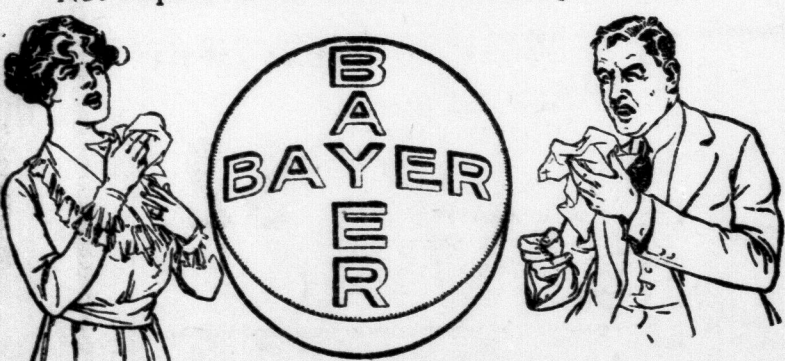

TERRIFIC STORM AT OTTAWA CRIPPLES UP ELECTRICAL SERVICE

Lightning, Wind, Hail and Rain Cause Heavy Damage.

OTTAWA, June 1.—A terrific storm broke over Ottawa this afternoon, when two buildings, a barn and a warehouse were hit by lightning and destroyed, and telephone and electric services were interrupted, many windows broken by the hail, awnings and trees blown down, and the street car service stopped. In the 20 minutes while the storm raged 1.43 inches of rain fell, which is the highest ever recorded in this city.

The lightning and rain came with a strong southwest wind which was over the city for about 10 minutes. The Bell Telephone Company announced that between 1,000 and 1,200 telephones are out of order in the city as the result of the storm, mostly caused by wires being broken by falling trees and by underground cables grounding, owing to the flood of water under the street. About 150 electric light services were broken, and several business houses had a close down, owing to interruption of their power supply. As far as could be ascertained, the storm was a local one. No damage has been reported from any of the surrounding towns with which it was possible to get into communication tonight.

TEMPORARY PEACE BETWEEN CITY AND DETROIT RAILWAY CO.

Company Withdraws "No Transfer" Orders After Injunction Issued.

DETROIT, June 1.—A temporary settlement of the wage-fare controversy between the city and the Detroit Railway Company whereby the company will withdraw from its "no transfer" plan at midnight tonight was reached in circuit court late today.

The settlement followed the filing of a petition for an injunction restraining the railway company from refusing to issue transfers within the one-fare zone. The court set dates for further hearings without acting on the petition. The court ordered the company and the city reached an agreement, whereby free transfers will again be issued on five-cent fares, pending further hearing and negotiations, both in and out of court in an effort to reach a permanent settlement as to fare increases.

Answers to the city's charges in its petition for an injunction must be filed by Thursday morning by the company. The company was ordered to show in court Saturday the rescinding of the injunction proceedings, which will continue, despite the rescinding of the "no transfer" plan hearing will be held in the circuit court on the entire fare controversy.

ST. THOMAS MAN HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH UNDER AUTO

Wm. J. Brush Caught by Car When It Turned Turtle.

ST. THOMAS, June 1.—While on a brief visit to his parents at Milton on Sunday, the automobile William J. Brush, of P. R. Brakenstien St. Thomas, was driving struck some loose gravel, causing him to lose control of the steering wheel. The auto turned turtle, and Mr. Brush was caught under the car, the weight of it coming down on his breast.

When rescued he was found to be choking, and the raising of the car was accomplished just in time to save his life. His collarbone was dislocated, several teeth knocked out, and his body cut and bruised. He was insensible for several hours, but is now reported convalescing.

BUILDING PERMITS AMOUNT TO \$27,000

ST. THOMAS, June 1.—The building permits issued during May show a slight increase over those filed a month ago, the largest being for a \$18,000 warehouse tanks, etc., to be erected on the old athletic park for the Imperial Oil Company. Toronto other than a \$3,000 brick residence on St. Ann's Place for D. Mariatt; the rest are for garages and alterations to buildings. The total amount of permits reached practically \$27,000.

Little Wild Flowers, Packing Marvelous Kick, Are Sought by Crowds.

Men, women and children with baskets, pails and bags, visit the scene daily, and although they may pick diligently for hours, acquiring sufficient potential wine to last through several arid seasons, enough remains to give the whole work a party.

Persons who have taken up this advanced course in botany say that a mere ten quarts of dandelion blossoms, to which have been added water, sugar, yeast and a period during which a working agreement is reached by the various ingredients, will in a few weeks become one of the smoothest of remedies for the "alibi." CHURCH BELLS, FIRE SIREN AND WHISTLES WELCOME BABY CITY

Impromptu Celebration Is Staged in Owen Sound Monday Midnight.

OWEN SOUND, June 1.—Owen Sound is now a city, and although the real celebration of her cityhood comes on July 1, a little impromptu celebration was staged at midnight Monday, with only a few participants. A few minutes before 12 o'clock the factory whistle commenced to blow, and promptly at 12 the big bell on the town hall added its clang to the general hubbub.

The firemen brought out the motor truck and its siren whistle as it raced about the streets awakened the citizens from their slumbers; it was a replica of armistice night only on a smaller scale.

Congratulate Mayor.

The city fathers who were meeting in committee to consider the erecting of a memorial for the men who were killed in action and to arrange for the program on July 1, promptly adjourned when the noise started after a resolution had been passed congratulating Mayor Roland Patterson on being the last mayor of the town and the first mayor of the City of Owen Sound.

Just two men have been clerks of the town of Owen Sound in 63 years, the late Thomas Gordon and his nephew, the present clerk, Charles Gordon. There are thirteen men living who have occupied the mayor's chair out of a list of 23. A spirit of optimism prevails in the baby city today and congratulations were never better for progress.

WHITEWASH, MADE RIGHT, GOOD PAINT

Particularly Adaptable For Use On Farm Buildings.

There is no farm paint cheaper than whitewash and there are few paints that serve a better purpose for the farmer. It keeps stock clean, keeps or houses of a temporary character on the farm, and even some of the very good buildings, when the whitewash is properly made.

There is nothing in color on the farm and barnyard buildings that beats white for a show. It is the cleanest most attractive and has a sort of magnifying effect at a distance. It can be used on any rough surface, from the inside of the main body of trees, and when prepared to stay on, is not objectionable for the barnyard buildings. Besides carrying the appearance of neatness and cleanliness, it is an eradicant of insects, to a very extent. There is no better preparation to use on the trunks of fruit and shade trees.

There are numerous formulas for compounding whitewash. Some are very good, others only medium, and still others are scarcely worth the trouble and time of putting on, as they wash off with the first rain or blister, and scale off.

A very good combination is one-half bushel of slaked lime, slaked with boiling water; this should be covered with kerosene to keep the steam in. Strain the liquid through a fine wire sieve or strainer and add to it a peck of salt, previously dissolved in warm water; three pounds of rice boiled to a thin paste and stirred in. Add half a pound of Spanish whiting; one pound of glue, previously dissolved. Add five gallons of hot water to this mixture and stir well. This mixture is serviceable on wood, brick or stone.

The spring season is the natural time for cleaning and painting. This preparation keeps well and can be used at any convenient time after being prepared. It is not necessary to repaint every spring with whitewash prepared in this way, though a little retouching often helps the more exposed parts of buildings and fences. The most discouraging feature of whitewash has been from poorly prepared stuff, poor quality of lime and hot water will make whitewash good enough, and under this careless way of treating the subject, leave out the glue, rice and Spanish whiting, the very properties needed to perfect its adhesive and lasting qualities.

LABOR WILL OPPOSE HIGHER FEES SET BY DOCTORS' ASSOCIATION

HAMILTON, June 1.—Hamilton labor circles will lead in a drive against the big boost in doctors' fees, announced by the local association. R. J. Halford, well-known labor leader, declared that the new local charges, which became effective today, are "infamous." He pointed out that labor favored state medical care, and he declared the matter would be threshed out in the Legislature. Fifty new doctors are said to have come to Hamilton within the past six months.

DR. F. A. BENNETTO RESIGNS.

QUELPI, June 1.—After serving the city as chairman of the light and heat commission for the last year and a half, Dr. F. A. Bennetto has written Mayor Westoby announcing his resignation, to take effect at once.

During his term of office Dr. Bennetto has proved himself a splendid official, and his decision to resign will be generally regretted.

In his letter to the mayor, Dr. Bennetto does not state his reasons for stepping out, but it is known that his health has not been of the best for some time, and only recently he underwent an operation for appendicitis.

WINDSOR POLICE TO STOP JOYRIDING

WINDSOR, June 1.—Following a number of auto crashes during the past two days in Windsor, in which three persons were hurt, a score of cars damaged and one demolished, Mayor Winter issued instructions to the police commission tonight to institute a vigorous campaign against speeding. He ordered the arrest and imposition of the maximum penalty in cases of men found guilty of violation of traffic laws.

L. Asynitz of River Rouge, Detroit, is at death's door in Hotel Dieu tonight and Leo Scars, Detroit, is also suffering from serious injuries. Both men were forced in front of different street cars by automobiles.

Mayor Winter stated tonight that one of the reasons for the ban on the sale of near-beer was to stop the visits of Detroiters who come over merely for joyrides.
