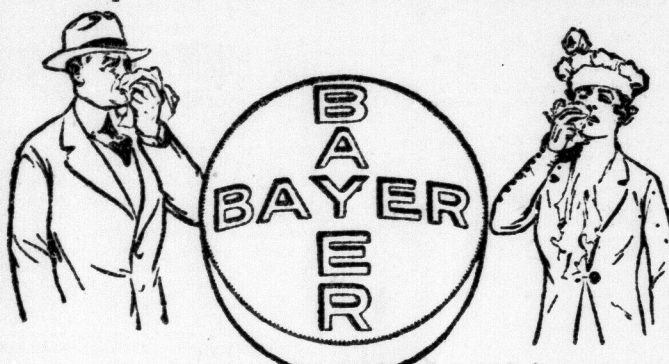

PROPER HOUSING FOR CHILD WELFARE NOW IMPOSSIBLE, CLAIM

Architect Tells Convention Land Speculation Is To Blame.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—(Canadian Press.)—Delegates to the number of approximately 150 gathered in the conference room at the department of health building for the opening of the Dominion conference on child welfare this morning. The conference, which will last for two days and which will consider and discuss ways and means for improving the condition of children and incidentally of the home, was opened with an address by Dr. John A. Amyot, deputy minister of health.

A tentative memorandum, setting forth the aims and objects of the child welfare division, department of health, was distributed among the delegates. It contains information regarding this phase of the department's work under the various heads, and states that the general aims are:

"To help the home; to help find a true home for every homeless child; to save and preserve maternal and child life; to promote and secure material and child welfare; to maintain and improve the health, strength and well-being of mothers and children; to make known to all the principles of maternal and child welfare and the supreme importance of home life to the individual and to the nation; so that the national interest in these matters may be aroused and the best modern methods for securing the welfare of the home and child may be understood and carried out."

Steps Explained.

The steps taken by Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and Saskatchewan for bettering the conditions of child life were explained to the conference by representatives of those provinces.

Mrs. Arthur Rogers, Winnipeg, advocated uniform legislation for bettering the condition of illegitimate children and the children of neglected mothers and children.

Enid Forsythe, secretary of the Child Welfare section of the Canadian public health association, urged the formation of a joint council of all children's welfare organizations.

BROTHER GRIEF-STRICKEN BY TRAGIC DEATH AT HIS HANDS OF SISTER

Fears Expressed For Lad's Mental Condition—No Inquest Necessary.

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 19.—Fears are expressed today for the mental condition of Charles McKaig, the 16-year-old lad who accidentally shot and killed his 14-year-old sister yesterday at the Ottawa settlement, near Hepworth.

The lad and his sister were very closely attached to each other, and as a result of the tragedy young McKaig is said to be nearly out of his mind with grief.

Since his mother's death a number of years ago, Charles McKaig has been making his home with Mr. and Mrs. Mulloy of Shallow Lake, about five miles away, but was in the habit of visiting all his holidays with his sister. Yesterday he had spent the day with her, and was about to return to Shallow Lake when his sister, who was in the house, called to him and coaxed him to stay a little longer, and it was as he was returning to the house that the gun which he was carrying was accidentally discharged, the bullet passing through the window and striking his sister in the head, causing instant death.

RAPS DINGMAN OVER LETTER TO GUELPH DOCTOR

Godfrey Terms Action of License Official Grati-tious Insult.

TORONTO BOOTLEGGERS Sensational Stories About Police and Rum Runners Working Together.

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—W. S. Dingman of Stratford, vice-chairman of the Ontario Board of License Commissioners, was questioned last afternoon at a sitting of the committee of the Ontario Legislature appointed to inquire into the bootlegging situation.

Mr. P. P. Forbes, regarding a letter which the vice-chairman had sent to a Guelph doctor. Strong exception was taken to this letter by Dr. Godfrey, who claimed that the Guelph medical practitioner was in the 50 per cent class of bootleggers.

This Guelph doctor had issued only three prescriptions for liquor, and after his first prescription the letter in question was written to him. It concluded by saying that if the doctor is not tempted to get a start in practice by issuing liquor prescriptions, he will be considered a bootlegger.

The doctor, who had given for the case which has been in the papers, Dr. Godfrey said, and had served overseas.

"Demagogic admonition" and "gratuitous insult" were terms used by Dr. Godfrey with reference to Dingman's letter, and he strongly objected to medical men being undeservedly branded as bootleggers.

Mr. Dingman said there were peculiar circumstances in connection with the case which he was willing to explain, but not publicly. At the request of the committee, Mr. Dingman made his explanation in private and the matter was dropped.

Rev. Ben H. Spence, secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, suggested that the doctor be eliminated from the bar in standard hotels or strict regulation of them.

Dr. Forbes Godfrey gave evidence not appreciating Mr. Spence's suggestions.

"Are you in favor of cutting out smoking?" he asked Mr. Spence. "If he wants to part with it," Mr. Spence replied.

There was a pause. Dr. Godfrey did not take the hint. Thereupon Joseph E. Thompson, Conservative M. P. for North York, Toronto, handed a "smoke" to the Alliance secretary.

Dr. Godfrey seized the opportunity to lecture Mr. Spence. "I want to tell you," he said, "that a real doctor of tobacco has killed hundreds of people. Then you, on your professions, should not be smoking, because it is an effect from smoking. That is your argument as applied to liquor."

Mr. Spence kept the cigar.

CLAIM POLICE WITH RUM RUNNERS

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—The stories in circulation as to collusion between certain police officers in Toronto and bootleggers will be investigated by the special committee appointed by the Legislature to inquire into the enforcement of the Ontario temperance act.

The matter was brought to attention of the committee by J. W. Curry of Southeast Toronto, and he will submit names for the purpose of saving the persons who have been mentioned subpoenaed.

Mr. Curry made a rather sensational statement, when he told the committee this morning's proceedings he declared that there was not a hotel in the city of Toronto engaging in bootlegging. A room could not have a bottle of whiskey inside of ten minutes. Mr. Curry said he might be some evidence in the case.

Dr. Godfrey did not think the statement was fair to the hotels of Toronto.

MEDICAL COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE SERUM DISCOVERED BY GLOVER

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—The effects of the immunizing and curative serum for cancer discovered by Dr. Thomas J. Glover is being investigated by a special committee of the Toronto academy of medicine.

Whether Dr. Glover will give a demonstration and paper before the academy will depend upon the findings of this committee, said Dr. Jabez H. Elliott, president of the academy today.

In case the committee thinks the evidence given by Dr. Glover to be of sufficient importance, it may be presented to the whole academy this evening. Failing this, only the council may make the announcement of the result of the committee's investigation.

Who compose this committee is being kept very secret by the academy. It is rumored that it is composed of three prominent pathologists, of whom Professor T. J. MacKenzie of Toronto University is one.

DR. GRENELL URGES ADVANCED METHODS TO OPEN LABRADOR

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—Wireless telephones, wireless telegraphy, as well as aeroplanes, would do more to open up Labrador than any other modern means of communications, according to Dr. Alfred T. Grenfell, the celebrated doctor-missionary of Labrador.

Dr. Grenfell stated here today that lack of communication during the winter months was one of the greatest drawbacks of the country. Aeroplanes have been successfully flown over portions of Labrador, and aviators claim that the country is dotted with natural harbours. Wireless telephones and telegraphy also will be a great boon for the residents in the outlying districts of the country.

LEADING CONTRACTOR DIES AT PORT ARTHUR

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 19.—William Harrigan, contractor, died here yesterday. He was born in Beauce County, Que., in 1861, and has been engaged in the contracting business since 1883, and since then has been general manager or superintendent of the following works: Ballasting operations on the Intercolonial Railway, construction of the St. Charles branch and Pictou branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, St. John Bridge, Fredericton Bridge, Soudan Canal, Welland Canal, Port Colborne breakwater, Welland turning basin, etc.

He came here in 1906 and built the first section of the Port Arthur breakwater and other public works. He had been a member of the city council and a director of the Lockhart-Bertrand Lumber Company.

GOVERNMENT OFFERS \$1,000 REWARD FOR MURDERER'S ARREST

No Clue Yet To Perpetrator of Brutal Crime At Point Edward.

MAKING A PURSE Residents of Locality Are Preparing To Offer a Reward.

SARNIA, Oct. 19.—Witnessed by former school chums and playmates, many of whom were unable to fully comprehend the terrible tragedy that had befallen their friend, the funeral of Dorothy Ellen Buchanan, aged 10, was held from the family residence, Michigan avenue, Point Edward, this afternoon, the remains being interred at Lakeview Cemetery. The school children attended in a body, and sent a beautiful floral wreath as a tribute to the memory of their former comrade.

Speaking of the crime, Thomas Buchanan, father of the little girl who was foully murdered in Bayview Park Saturday night, could advance no theory for the crime which shocked this district.

Over 60 hours have elapsed since the murder, but the crime still remains a mystery to Provincial Inspector Boyd of Toronto. The custody, but later today police are scouring the county in search of the murderer, and every possible aid is being given the authorities by the people.

Reward of \$1,000.

A number of citizens have announced that they will start a purse as a reward for the arrest of the guilty party, and coupled with this Crown Attorney Wilson has made the following statement:

"I am authorized by the Government to offer a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest of the slayer of Dorothy Buchanan, the offer not to be open to constables. This is the most deadly crime recorded in the annals of Lambton County, and every resident of this district should help every way possible to facilitate the inquiry leading to the arrest of the criminal who committed the deed."

Continuing Search.

The fact that the crime occurred a few miles after 6 o'clock in the evening, such a public place would ordinarily simplify the matter of getting evidence, but the police have found it very difficult to ascertain any clue leading to the guilty person.

Tonight the authorities are conducting another diligent search of every inch of ground in Bayview Park in the hope that they may get some clue that will enable them to make an arrest.

A number of men have been questioned by the authorities and two men were taken into custody, but later today were released and the hunt for the murderer taken up with renewed energy.

Many residents of Point Edward are asking the city council and the police department for a cleanup of the foreign element.

DEATH OF JOHN M. WEIR.

ST. MARYS, Oct. 19.—The death of John M. Weir, a pioneer of the town, took place yesterday, at the advanced age of 87 years. Mr. Weir came to this town in 1847, 77 years ago, and has been a continuous resident since. The funeral will take place from his late residence, Cadzow Park, to the family plot in St. Mary's Cemetery on Wednesday at 3 o'clock.
