 years, a young lady from the Hospi-
 tal for Incurables at 130 Dunn-avenue,
 Parkdale, enjoyed the pleasures of an
 automobile ride around the city yester-
 day. It was the annual outing given
 to the inmates by the Ontario Motor
 League.

Upwards of 40 cars responded to
 Secretary E. M. Wilcox's call for out-
 ing cars for the day's act of kind-
 ness to those whose fortune has denied
 the pleasure of active life. So eager
 were the members of the league to
 extend their blessings to these un-
 fortunate that more cars than neces-
 sary assembled.

Promptly at 3 o'clock the proces-
 sion of automobiles, laden with all
 the 100 occupants of this home, start-
 ed for High Park via the Lake Shore-
 road. Upon arriving there a photo
 was taken and then the cars disper-
 sed into various parts of the city.

Humanity had in this procession a
 real study of life. Dipsomaniacs, the
 palsied, the blind and the paral-
 yzed, enjoyed, if such term were
 permissible, the fresh air and scenery
 of Toronto.

 so arranged that she could be laid
 on the floor and thus a splendid out-
 ing was given to the unfortunate girl.
 The nurse also enjoyed the outing.

 nington, H. B. Wills, P. Leadley and
 Secretary Wilcox. The Ontario Motor

 ant one, since there is no question
 that these "pacifiers" are universally
 used.

 from his boarding-house station in
 about July 29, was found this morning
 suspended from a tree in the bush, a
 mile from the town, he having used a
 fine wire to commit the deed.

MARINE ENQUIRY TO BE RESUMED
 OTTAWA, July 30.—The enquiry into
 the charges made by the civil service
 commissioners against the officials of
 the marine department will be re-
 sumed before Judge Casels in Montreal
 on Sept. 2. The enquiry will then be
 continued in Quebec and Montreal
 and will be concluded as speedily as
 possible.

Lightning Causes \$100,000 Fire.
 SACKVILLE, N. B., July 30.—Light-
 ning early to-day set on fire the build-
 ings of the Enterprise Foundry, and
 they were totally destroyed. The fire
 spread to the Intercolonial Hotel,
 which was ruined, and the railway
 station was saved with difficulty. The
 loss is \$100,000.

 death.

**MOB, DESPITE BULLETS
 LYNCH NEGRO FOR ASSAULT**

Two Killed and Others May Die
 as Result of Storming Jail to
 Capture Criminal.

PENSACOLA, Fla., July 30.—Two
 men killed and nine wounded, several
 fatally, is the record of the clash last
 midnight between a mob bent upon
 lynching Leander Shaw, a negro, and
 the sheriff and his forces, in which
 the mob finally overpowered the au-
 thorities.

The lynching was carried out in the
 most prominent park of this city.
 Shaw, yesterday assaulted a girl, Li-
 lita, and was highly respected a lady
 near this city during the absence of
 her husband and after cutting her
 throat, clubbed her over the head with
 a revolver.

During the afternoon crowds began
 forming upon the streets and early
 in the night they were reinforced by
 large numbers of men from the coun-
 try. The mob then attacked the county
 jail, where the negro was confined,
 breaking down the jail gate, and the sheriff
 and his deputies opened fire with
 Winchester and shotguns. Three of
 the mob dropped. Volley after volley
 was fired by the mob, but it was
 unable to enter the jail.

About midnight another attack was
 made, the mob having been increased
 to 1000 determined men. The attack
 was successful. It was made up on all sides
 of the jail. One party forced its way
 thru the rear, overpowered the officers
 and secured the troubling prisoner.
 A noise was slipped about his neck,
 and after being dragged for two blocks
 he was strung up to an electric light
 pole in the centre of the park, where
 fully 2000 bullets completely riddled his
 body.
