GRAIN AND PRODUCE.

The report indicated a total yield of 726,000,000 bushels, against 694,000,000 bushels last year. This was about an excess of 32,000,000 bushels.

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DENTONIA PARK FARM

DAMAGED BY C.N.R. LINE

Railway Ordered to Pay \$30,000 Into Court Preliminary to Construction.

Pending arbitration proceedings to fix compensation for damages to Dentonia Park Farm caused by the passage of the C. N. R. thru that property, the railway company was ordered by Judge Denton yesterday to pay into court the sum of \$30,000 as security preliminary to their proceeding with construction.

Mr. Smith of Watson, Smoke & Smith, representing Mrs. Susan N. B. Massey, owner of the farm, asked that the company be forced to pay \$100,000 into court, alleging that \$250,000 had been expended in improvements, and that the running of the railway thru the middle of the property would result in serious depreciation of its value. He pointed out that the property containing 600 acres was not a farm alone, but a park laid out in golf links, tennis courts, trout ponds, terraces, etc., and containing handsome summer residences. Its charm would be practically ruined by the crossing of the railway.

Mr. Reed appearing for the C. N. R. did not regard the situation in such a hopeless light. All his company wanted was a 100-foot right of way thru the farm section, and would not touch the past property. About the only damage the line would do to the property outside of the expropriation of land would be to the driveway crossing the farm. He contended that \$15,000 paid into court would be ample security.

The court also considered that the alleged damages were largely sentimental. A row of trees planted along the track on either side the thought would go a long way towards hiding the trains from view.

In reply to Mr. Smith's objection against the shunting of cars, Mr. Reed said the company had purchased property in the Don Valley for yards, and that there would be no shunting whatever near the Massey property. The court then ruled that \$30,000 should be paid in as security.

HORSE SHOW REVIVED

Will Be Combined With Military Tournament Next May.

After a cessation of one year, the Canadian Horse Show, the pioneer of the horse shows in Canada, will be revived with greater lustre during the first week in May next.

The Cavalry Regiments of Toronto will combine with the Canadian Horse Show Association and the event will be not only a horse show, but a military show. The military events will be of an interesting and spectacular character and some of them will be open to all cavalry regiments.

According to Chairman R. H. Graham, the statement is the most complete yet submitted and contains several important recommendations. One of the recommendations is that the exhibition grounds and the erection of an improved structure in a better location, at an estimated cost of \$25,000.

Another proposal is that the deer paddock in High Park be enlarged. It now contains four acres and Mr. Wilson thinks the area should be about doubled. These changes are approved by the chairman.

Twenty-Five Miles of New Track.

Manager Fleming of the street railway is so sure that the privy council judgment next May will give the company full control of the street that he is already jubilant. He declares that when the law lords have pronounced the railway will put down tracks on Bay-street, Wilton-avenue, St. Patrick-street and wherever else it desires, whether the city likes it or not. He has 25 miles of tracks in view, but says nothing about serving the city.

That Toronto harbor will have to be dredged in the event of the Welland Canal being deepened, is pointed out by Capt. Anthony Malone of the R. C. M. V. Co., in a letter to the mayor. The harbor is 14 feet deep, and the captain thinks it should be made 22 feet.

Big Sale for Lauder.

The sale of seats for Harry Lauder began yesterday morning, and while there was a long line outside the day, the capacity of the hall is so great that excellent locations are available for each concert. There are large numbers of people coming from all over Ontario to the Lauder of Laughter. Harry Lauder has been euphoniously called.

Boehmer Pleads Guilty.

A. O. Boehmer pleaded guilty in the sessions yesterday afternoon at the office of Rev. W. B. Creighton, D.D., editor Christian Guardian, when he married Miss Phyllis Robinson, daughter of the late James Hill Robinson of New York to James Hill Robinson, N.J. Both are members of the Lew Fields attraction playing at the Royal Victoria Theatre, and were attended by two of their fellow players, Mr. and Mrs. William Gieston.

Temperance Electors to Meet.

A meeting of temperance electors will be held to-night in Westmoreland Methodist Church, Halton and Westmoreland. The chair will be occupied by Miles Vokes, and among the speakers will be Controller Hocken, Ald. J. Graham, R. H. Graham and Keeler. F. G. McBrien, J. O. McCarthy and J. V. T. May.

Steel Syndicate Made Money.

PARIS, Dec. 15.—The syndicate of French banks, which was formed last spring with the expectation of listing a million shares of United States Steel common stock on the Paris Bourse, was dissolved a few days ago, after liquidating its holdings at a splendid profit.

Australian Grant for Settlers.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 15.—Under the clause settlement bill now before the Victorian Parliament, a million pounds sterling annually will be available for the purchase of land for immigrants to Australia. This is enough to settle a thousand families annually.

Burglar Was Felled.

CHATHAM, Dec. 15.—(Special).—A desperado called at the residence of P. D. McKellar, registrar for Kent, late last night and demanded money. He flourished a gun. McKellar slammed the door and telephoned for the police, but the man escaped.
