### NORTH TORONTO COUNCIL MET AGAIN LAST NIGHT

May Vote on Street Lighting and Annexation at Same Time—County Delegates.

NORTH TORONTO, July 19.—(Special.)—To-night's meeting of the town council, attended by Mayor Brown and all the members except Councillor Munton, was not notable for any outstanding features, but a good deal of business of one kind or other was put through.

The Volunteer Firemen's Association was given the customary grant of \$35 in aid of their picnic, which takes place at the Waterworks Park early in August. The local firemen will also compete in the principal contests which take place in Welland shortly, and an excursion will be run from this point.

T. W. Banton and Mr. Riley represented a large majority of the property owners of North Toronto, who are anxious to extend the present building limit to Alberta-crescent. The extension will entail no hardship and council saw no difficulty in acceding to Mr. Banton's request, with the result that no frame structures can be built on Merton-street between Yonge and Alberta-crescent.

The resignation of Town Clerk Douglas was received and accepted with regret, and offers will be received from applicants for the position.

The report of the M.H.O., Dr. Jeffs, was received relative to the condition of the town water, as well as to the amount of salary received by himself, \$40 a year, which he regarded as hardly commensurate with the duties. Referred to finance committee.

The matter of a report re the installation of street lighting by Engineer James, was referred to in resolution submitted by Councillor Reid, and in this the suggestion was thrown out that as a vote would be required shortly on the lighting matter, the question of annexation could be dealt with at the same time. This will probably be done in the near future.

Councillor Howe submitted a petition for a six inch watermain on Cleveland; Councillor Murphy a concrete sidewalk on Merton-street, and Councillor Reid a sidewalk on Merton-street. Several other matters were dealt with.

Mayor Brown, Charles Murphy, Chas. Norris, John T. Watson, Walter Munton, R. J. Gibson and two or three other brethren will represent York Lodge, A. F. & A. M., at the Masonic Grand Lodge, which meets in Belleville to-morrow.

There will be a big turnout from the town and district north to Jackson's Point to-morrow. Assistant Manager Livingston went up to-night in order to be early on the ground.

Building operations in town, while not unusually brisk, are fairly good and a number of new houses are projected to go up later in the season. Reeve George S. Henry Dupuis, John Watson and Syme and Griffiths met with G. T. R. officials at the Belt Line crossing to-night at Fairbank to-night, where the work of reconstruction is going on, and where council insists that the passage way under the bridge must be deepened, giving more headroom. It is charged that loads of hay can hardly pass under.

**TORONTO VEGETABLE GROWERS.**  
The annual excursion of the Toronto branch of the Vegetable Growers' Association will take place to Queen Victoria Park, Niagara Falls, on Wednesday, Aug. 10. A good program of sports has been prepared and over \$100 in prizes will be awarded. The committee in charge has succeeded in making some very fine arrangements and altogether a great outing is assured.

**NEW C. N. R. BRIDGE.**  
The first bridge on the Toronto-Ottawa line of the Canadian Northern is now being placed over the Don. The new line leaves the Parry Sound rails in the Don Valley near Leslie-street, crosses the Don right there, then goes under the Don-road, and over Trent Creek to the Massey farm, and then on thru Scarborough. It is pretty well graded most of the distance, and the new bridge now being placed in position, and which ought to be finished in a few days, will allow the rails to be laid on up to the York town line, and further east as far as the grading has been done. The concrete abutments for the new bridge have been ready for some weeks. There are two half-ton 100 foot girder spans, making a total length of 200 feet, and the girders spaced 18 feet from column to column, so as to give ample clearance for all traffic.

A reply was received approving of the arrangements and expressing her appreciation of the kindness act of the society in Toronto. The interment took place at the Necropolis.

### BLINDED BY FLYING GLASS

Traveler Meets With Serious Accident in Odd Way.

Samuel Thompson, 56 Hewitt-avenue, a traveler for the Rice Lewis Company, was the victim of a most unusual accident Monday evening. While standing at Humboldt-avenue waiting for a Dundas-street car, he passed him at a high speed. The track is very rough at this point and a window was looted from its frame. The glass sailed in an outward curve toward the ground. It struck Thompson's hat, cleaving the brim and cutting into his cheek and right eye. He was led to a nearby grocery store and Dr. J. J. Matheson, eye-specialist, Thompson was taken to the General Hospital in a private ambulance, where the eye was removed. The piece of track where the accident occurred was condemned by the Ontario Railway Board as dangerous.

### Railway Wreck in Ireland.

DUBLIN, July 19.—Several cars of an excursion train on the Great Southern Railway broke away from the locomotive to-day, and running wild down an incline, crashed into a passenger train. Many persons jumped from the runaway cars, and tumbled down the embankment. About 100 persons were injured, most of them slightly.

### KILLED 2000 DOGS IN CITY

Suppression of Rabies Wiping Out Canine Population.

At the meeting of the police committee yesterday, it was reported that from March 1 to July 9, 2012 dogs have been destroyed in Toronto. As Chief Grasett puts it, "this is the penalty Toronto has paid to suppress rabies. There were 381 dogs caught by the police, and the others were taken to stations by owners." In recognition of gallant services, Constable Pasching was given six months' advance towards promotion. Early in the morning of July 4, the constable entered a burning house at 192 Dundas-street and rescued three men, two women and four children. They were sleeping soundly, and in the dense smoke which soon had been suffocated. Plans of the new No. 10 police station in East Toronto were approved. The city has provided about \$5,000 for the building. The resignations of Constables Acton, Barton, Huntley and Prossers were accepted. The appointment of a magistrate to make out bail bonds at night will not be taken up until the return of Judge Winchester and Magistrate Denison. Magistrate Kingsford presided yesterday.

### Threw Ammonia in His Face.

Because Richard Harris would not leave her home upon request, Mrs. Louisa Pearce, 345 West King-street, threw a cup of ammonia in his face and injured his eyes. She was charged with wounding when she appeared in police court yesterday. She was remanded till to-morrow.
