## PROVE CARRANZA WAS ASSASSINATED

AY 27-1920

Commission Probing His Death Submits Report After Investigation.

### DIED BY TREACHERY

Four of Five Prisoners Were Forced to Sign Document That He Suicided.

Mexico City, May 26.— Formal investigation for the purpose of clarifying the part taken in the death of President Carranza, both by Colonel Rodolfo Herrero and members of the Carranza party, is recommended by the commission of four named by Generals Obregon and Gonzales to inquire into the tragedy at Tlaxcalantongo The commission submitted its report last night, and cited ten points which the members had agreed had been proven from stories of witnesses. It was added that in a number of points many other stories purporting to tell the actual circumstances could not be confirmed and were unworthy of cre-

The commission's report, which is the first authoritative story of the death of Carranza, may be summarized as follows:

"Colonel Herrero joined the Carranza party at Putla, state of Puebla, on May 20, following a conference with General Francisco de P. Mariel, to whom he surrendered last March. Herrero pledged allegiance anew, and sed to defend Carranza, which promise was accepted by General Mar-iel, who fold the fugitive president that


