Morning Cotton Letter. New York, Jan. 27.—While the supply of cotton available to the world's spinners at the present time, including the amount remaining to come into sight from the south is probably larger than it was at the same date in the July year, and while prices of the staple are continued to work steadily downward without any rally of consequence, it must not be forgotten that since 1904 the spinners of the world had increased from 104,850,000 to at least 122,300,000 and that trade conditions are now better than they were then.
