London has a “poetry house”—in other words, a new shop for the sale of books of poetry. It was opened with ceremonies and speechmaking. It is described as “an attempt to revive the pleasant and intimate bookshop of the past.”

THE INTERNATIONAL MAP.

The international map of the world, on a scale of 1 to 1,000,000, will, when completed, eight or ten years hence, cover a total area of about 150 feet by 75 feet, on the surface of a globe 40 feet in diameter. It will consist of about 1500 sheets, each representing a section of 4 degrees in latitude and 6 in longitude. The first sheet of the United States portion has just been published by the Geological Survey, in New Hampshire, Maine and Nova Scotia. It is printed in six colors. Ocean depths and terrestrial altitude are shown by contour lines and graduated tints. It represents the beginning of a more accurate map of the United States than any that now exists.

COAL AND THE X-RAY.

It is now believed that the mystery of the formation and constitution of coal, which has long puzzled students, will be solved by means of the X-ray.

According to a French scientific journal, there are two or three kinds of ash in coals: First, the foreign matter carried by the wind or the rain into the forests that gave rise to the coal. Next there is the mineral matter that forms part of living plants. Finally, there is generally more or less mineral matter due to the formation of new compounds by the decomposition of the first two kinds of ash. The examination of coal with three forms of ash, and will thus contribute to throw light on the formation of veins.

SILVER IN PLACE OF NICKEL.

There is a tendency among the automobile manufacturers to make use of silver plating instead of nickel for covering the exposed metal parts of the machine. The latter has the advantage of hardness, but when exposed to the weather it becomes covered with an oxide which is hard to remove, while silver is whiter, takes a higher polish and when it becomes tarnished it is easier to clean. The difference in the cost of silver is slight.
