The Scheme as Viewed in Mng-land.

Telling of the departure of the first of Lord Rothschild's emigrants, the London Leader said:

"The committee who are administering the scheme are endeavoring to establish the following points:

"That an adult person can be emigrated, given an outfit and a small sum of money, for £10.

"That carefully chosen emigrants will, in time, refund the greater part of the money advanced to them, thus enabing others to be sent out.

"That work can be found for families, so that they can go into situations on their entry into Canada.

"That by following these lines on a large

Hopes for Repayment.

On the contrary the highest authorities are firmly convinced that the failure of the conference will not bring war: first, because their advices show that Germany does not want war, and secondly, because French official and public opinion is strongly against war. It is therefore the expectation in military circles that the deadlock at Algeciras will drag along until disagreement is manifest and then some definite action will be taken, leaving the main Franco-German issue where it was before the conference was decided upon.
