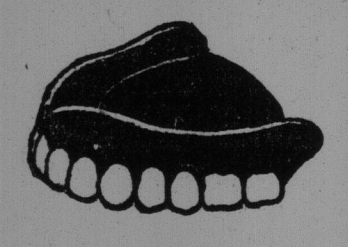

**MONCTON NEWS**

MONCTON, April 21—C. V. Clement, of Magog, Quebec, has arrived in Moncton with three racing steeds to be trained on the Moncton track and entered in the maritime circuit. The names of the horses are May Girl, a black mare, record 2:28; Robert C, a bay gelding, no mark; and Mabel Patch, bay mare, no mark. Mr. Clement will make Moncton his headquarters and claim he has three horses just enough to take away a fair share of the purses hung up at the different maritime meets. Robert C. is a full brother to Banner Boy, who has a mark of 2:10.

Scott Act Officer McBean, since the recent discussion of his enforcement by the police committee, has been active in ferreting out evidence against violators of the law, and states that it is his intention to prosecute more vigorously in the future. It is noteworthy, however, that while the Scott Act officer and another officer have been visiting places suspected of selling liquor and found no evidence upon which to base an information, there are no less than four places within a stone's throw of the police court where narrowness are run openly. This morning one of the violators of the act in such close proximity to the police headquarters, was before the court and the case closed over for a week.

"The Echoes Free" Dr. de, Capt. Pridgie, sailed from port tonight for Boston, with a cargo of lumber, shipped by John Cranall.

The steamer Walcott C. returned to Moncton this morning and is loading freight for Albert County and Nova Scotia ports.

**A HORRIBLE DEATH**

WINNIPEG, Man., April 23 (Special)—Donald Smith, a bachelor farmer in the Bentley district, while harvesting, became entangled in the lines and the horses making off he was dragged to death under the barrow.

**O. B. AKERLY BUYS TOLLS**

He and F. L. Potts Were Only Bidders for Market Collections—Stalls Also Sold.

The annual sale of the market tolls, stalls and city scales was held this morning in the city market, and \$5,403.20 was realized. This is about \$800 more than was received last year, the increase being mainly in consequence of the recent decision of the council to sell twelve stalls from which there has previously been no revenue. Walter S. Potts was auctioneer. Stall A was purchased by P. J. Hamilton for \$51.00; Stall B went to Manning and Kierstead for the same figure; stall C was again secured by James E. Earle, and stall D by H. S. Hammond, also for \$51 each. James P. Quinn again bid for stalls E and F for \$101. The upset price on these stalls was \$50.  
The commission stands in the centre of the market, which were under sold in previous years, were then offered. They are letters G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, and R. They were offered separately, but no one bid on them, and they were withdrawn. They were then offered for sale; the buyer to take one or more, as he wished, and after some sharp bidding starting at the upset price of \$50, they were knocked down to William Daley for \$52.10 each, he taking the lot, amounting in all to \$625.20. The weighing scale at the north end in Kings ward was sold to Gilbert Robinson for \$28, and the Adelaide street scale to S. T. Vaughan for \$11.  
The market tolls were then offered for sale, starting at the upset price of \$3,800. The only two bidders were F. L. Potts and O. B. Akerly, and after some sharp bidding Mr. Akerly secured the privilege for \$4,400. This is \$200 more than was received last year and \$734 more than in 1904.  
Mr. Daley expects to sublet the stalls which he bought.

**SENT FOR POLICE WHILE SHE TALKED**

How North End Woman Assisted in Capture of Two Boys Now Charged With Theft.

The case against Joseph McElhenry and Karol Kemp, arrested on suspicion of stealing \$300 worth of brass from the old "Academy" the property of E. Leatulum, M. P. P., was resumed in the police court this morning. D. Mullin, K. C. appeared for Kemp.

Mrs. Lovatofsky wife of the owner of the second-hand store kept on Simonds street, said that Tuesday last two boys came to her husband's shop and requested her to buy the brass. The witness replied that she had purchased anything from minors, but subsequently asked the boys how much per pound they wanted for the brass. They asked her to give five cents per pound. Mrs. Lovatofsky then went outside and dispatched her brother to get the police. The latter came to the shop and arrested them.

Morris Schaffer, who does business on Simonds street, said that McElhenry came to his store on Monday and offered the brass for sale. He refused to buy. In answer to Mr. Mullin's witness said he did not see young Kemp.

Officer Green stated that he found the boys at Lovatofsky's shop and the prisoners told him that they found the brass in the mud at the foot of Starr's wharf. The brass was found in a box, and the boys, (which weighed 18 pounds), in the possession of the boys, there were not any more brass on any part of it. Officer Green also told about visiting the cruiser. Mr. Lantulum is at present out of the city and the case was stood over for three days.

**THE RELIEF FUND FOR SAN FRANCISCO**

The Times-Telegraph fund for the relief of the San Francisco sufferers now reaches a total of \$4,004.75. Of this amount \$3,300 has already been sent to Mayor Schmitz of Prince and more will be sent as soon as it accumulates. **WALL STREET**

NEW YORK, April 23—The prevailing tone of the stock market today was heavy but the declines were generally narrow and were mixed with a few gains. Some of the stocks with large property interests in San Francisco rebounded sharply from recent depression. United Railways investment rose 4 1/4 and Pacific Coast 3. The notable declines were Anaconda 2 1/2 and Reading and Colorado Fuel, largely fractions. The trading was quiet and transactions small.
