Lewis Defeated Mandot. Boston, Oct. 26.—Ted Lewis, the English lightweight, was given the decision over Joe Mandot, of New Orleans, by a wide margin in a 12-round bout tonight. Mandot put up a game exhibition, but was knocked down for the count of nine in the first round, and was felled again in the tenth and twelfth rounds.

Roddie McDonald Shot. Halifax Recorder.—A message from Gloucester Bay last night said that Roddie McDonald had been accidentally shot in the leg. Later particulars brought the information that Roddie who has recently moved into his new residence was doing some work about the dining room when a revolver fell to the ground and exploded and McDonald had received a wound just above the knee. Bay Wood was to have left for Boston for Halifax this afternoon but he has been wired as to the accident to McDonald, and that the bout is therefore off.

All English battalions were recently warned to keep a careful watch for any contrivances which the Germans might use with the object of producing poisonous gases. FOOTBALL Captain Protests Debarments

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 25.—Louis S. Middlebrook, captain of the Yale 1915 nine in a statement made public on Monday, says he feels almost personally responsible for the debarment of Captain Arthur M. Milburn and four other baseball players from intercollegiate athletics for violation of the summer baseball rule. He said that he understood that the conditions under which the men were playing at Quogue, L. I., where the infraction occurred, but did not know they constituted a violation of the Yale rule. It was not until Prof. Robert N. Corwin, chairman of the Yale athletic committee had written him during the summer, asking him if the no-baseball rule was being kept that he looked up the rule, Middlebrook said.

He then placed the matter in the hands of George B. Case, of New York, the graduate baseball adviser, and subsequently the athletic committee took action. Mr. Middlebrook says: "As a Yale baseball captain I wish to say I should have known the rules and been in a position to advise the players against breaking them. I wish to relieve all the players and the members of the athletic committee from a responsibility that I feel ought to be on my own shoulders."

Bernard Tommers, Yale, 1911, assistant coach of the baseball team, also issued a statement in which he says he advised the men to play, not knowing that the conditions under which they were to play would be a violation of the rule.

Prof. Corwin declined to comment on or say whether they would have any effect on the status of the debarred players.

The captain had not been long married when he was ordered into camp. MORAN REFUSED TO MEET COFFEY

Attachment Had Been Made Against His Share of the Receipts—Chairman Weack Averted Trouble

There were very few of the ten thousand spectators at Madison Square Garden on Tuesday evening, when Frank Moran wrecked the hopes of Jim Coffey, who realized that by a slight margin of good fortune a desperate situation that would undoubtedly have resulted in a riot of serious consequences was narrowly averted. Fifteen minutes before the big battle was to be staged Frank Moran said that he was not going to enter the ring. An attachment, which had been plastered against his share of the receipts brought about the startling crisis. The big battler, knowing about the court order, declared determinedly to the promoters: "No money, no fight." There was no use arguing with the fighter, for the situation had been threshed out repeatedly and always brought forth the same response: "No money, no fight."

Down in the vast amphitheatre were those ten thousand frenzied fans who had been whipped up to the nerve-racking point, for they were to see the two best big white men in the country fight for the privilege of hurling a well-backed deft at Jess Willard and his world's crown.

The management knew all this, and they also knew that it would be verging on foolhardiness to tell those ten thousand and fans there would be no fight. The bare announcement, a mighty howl, a leader, and what a raging mob would do

under these circumstances can easily be imagined. There was only one thing to do; put the hair trigger situation up to the State Athletic Commission and hope for relief. Fred Wenck, the recently appointed chairman of the board, was sought out and the case explained. It did not take Wenck long to solve the difficulty. Court order or not, the chairman ordered the management to hand over the \$6,500 (Moran's share), and within a few minutes it was given to Ike Dorgan, Moran's manager.

Two minutes before Wenck handed over the money Moran, satisfied he would not receive his guarantee, started for the street. He was making his way through the crowd when Wenck sent Willie Lewis to overtake the fighter and get him back. When Moran returned and learned that his money was secure he undressed again, entered the ring and achieved a victory that will bring him a fortune.




