

VERY SEVERE FIGHTING AGAIN

Allies Check Germans - One Counter Charge Well Attended to by Infantry

Paris, June 7.—The French War Office this afternoon reported: North of Arras, last night, engagement of artillery of extreme severity, particularly in the vicinity of Lorette, Ablain, "Chaboué" Rougeux near Souchez, "The Labyrinth" and Beure.

The enemy in the same sector delivered two counter attacks, each of which failed completely. The infantry checked the attacks.

The allies gained two-thirds of a mile east of the chapel of Lorette, and in the central part of "The Labyrinth" advanced about 100 yards.

This morning at five o'clock we delivered an attack near Hebuterne, occupied two successive lines of trenches made some prisoners and captured some machine guns.

To the north of the Aisne in very intense fighting, the allies have retained their gains.

The members of the Chaplains were assisted by many other ladies in preparing, distributing and collecting the boxes, and the members of the Red Cross in different wards are today assisting in counting the receipts at the Bank of Nova Scotia.

GENERAL ADVANCE BY ITALIANS; RESISTANCE DAILY GROWS STRONGER

Udine, Italy, June 7.—A general Italian advance in taking place today across the Isonzo river from Caporetto to the sea, a distance of about forty miles.

The movement is one of importance, and has been fighting in taking place at Gradisca and in the vicinity of this town. Masses of Italian troops have been concentrated on the roads from Cormons, Patruona and Cervignano.

The resistance of the Austrians is daily becoming stronger.

Venice, June 7.—The Italian military authorities have issued instructions to troops and striking by the remnants of the famous Roman amphitheatre at Pola, the Austrian naval base.

CASUALTIES NOW ARE WELL UP TO 7,800

Ottawa, June 7.—With 830 casualties reported at the week end the honor roll from the front continues to climb upwards. The aggregate today is 1,170 killed, 5,074 wounded and 1,548 missing. The officers' list, it is thought, is now complete. It totals about 600.

THE ASSEMBLY

Kingston, Ont., June 7.—Church union was vigorously discussed by the Presbyterian assembly today. The party for the continuation of the Presbyterian church in Canada made a determined effort to have a trace declared until after the war.
