B. C. IMMIGRATION Mrs. A. B. Hearn, British Columbia immigration secretary, in her report to Miss Gordon, said:

"We face the fact of the unfortunate tendency of our young people to migrate to the country to the south of us, especially our young men, whom we have educated at great expense in our public schools and other educational institutions, and just when they should be prepared to give the benefit of that training to their own country, many drift away to our southern neighbor. A remedy for this must be found by higher authorities than we can claim to be, and I hope this remedy will be found very soon! But in the year ending 31st March, 1925, government statistics tell us that 44,178 Canadians returned to Canada from the United States of America.

"It is deeply to be regretted that our Canadian governments do not see the necessity of making our Naturalization laws more stringent. Apparently outsiders are allowed to buy up our most valuable lands, timber and minerals, and may exploit them for their own benefit, without one thought of becoming British citizens, or owing any allegiance to the Empire for which they are deriving such benefit.

"In closing I would draw your attention to the tremendous world-wide race-problem confronting us, and coming nearer every day with the seeming millions of China, Japan and India, like hordes brimming over with humanity. The wonderful advance made in education, manufactures and science, with its telegraphs and cables, its ocean, railway and air services, bringing the whole world into such close touch that existence everywhere is being revolutionized, especially so among the colored races, who are asking for equal rights with the white races everywhere.

"The many sided problems of 'Immigration' and 'Migration' throughout the world are intricate and complex, and must be met by the closest study and effort of every thinking person. The immediate and pressing need of every one of us at the present time, is the building up of our own country and its National life, upon the solid foundation of British liberty, justice and truth, and we have a great task before us, calling for our concentrated wisdom and loyalty."
