There is much talk in the villages of Brookville and Torrybum over what is considered a very severe sentence imposed by the local stipendiary magistrate of the Parish of Simonds upon a boy about 11 years of age and who a few days ago, when sent to Brookville to buy newspapers, had a few cents in his possession. He lost the cents upon the platform of Brookville station. They were picked up by a little girl, the daughter of a neighbor. A childish squabble ensued for the possession of the money and as a result the parents of the girl had the boy and his father summoned before the magistrate's court. The result is that the magistrate sentenced the little boy to two years in the reformatory.

At the first trial the boy and his father were practically alone, having no witnesses, and it is said, an attempt was made to ask the magistrate to reconsider his sentence and accept the evidence of those who saw the children's squabble and mitigate the penalty. 


