## THE HALIFAX HEALTH CENTRE

In Connection With Dalhousie University—Corner Stone Laid

Cost \$250,000—Made Possible by the Munificence of the Rockefeller Foundation—A Unique Combination.

(Halifax Chronicle). Hon. George H. Murray, Premier of Nova Scotia, on Thursday laid the corner stone of Out-Patient and Public Health Clinic of the Medical School of Dalhousie University. The ceremony took place half an hour after noon and the programme opened with an invocation by Rev. Dr. J. Bond, pastor of the Grafton Street Methodist Church. Introductory remarks were then made by President MacKenzie, after which the Premier laid the stone and delivered an address. The proceedings closed with benediction by Dr. Bond.

The Governors and Senate of Dalhousie, as well as the entire medical and nursing profession were among those present. Representatives of the Massachusetts-Halifax Health Commission, Victoria Order of Nurses, Halifax Dispensary and other organizations interested in the new building were also present.

The corner stone is of Nova Scotia grey granite, the polished inscribed surface being about four feet six inches by two feet three inches, and is situated at the western end of the Morris street front. A platform with stairway leading to it from the ground level had been erected, and it was on this platform that the corner stone laying exercises took place.

Unique Combination.

There have been corner stones and corner stones laid in Halifax, but not in years has there been one so fraught with significance as that laid on the old Dalhousie campus yesterday by the

**Premier of Nova Scotia**. Its significance lies in the fact that it is the corner stone of a building that will give Dalhousie and Halifaxians advantages that in combination are unique. There have been medical colleges with hospitals annexed to them and there have been hospitals with out-patient clinics and free treatment for those unable to pay, but never before has any university had a place where a maternity hospital, out-patient clinic, preventive medicine and treatment free to those unable to afford medical care, welfare organization and public health centre have been combined under university jurisdiction. The maternity hospital does not, of course, belong to the Dalhousie medical college, but Dalhousie gave the site for the hospital in the understanding that Dalhousie medical students would be given opportunities for obstetrical work there.

Of Great Importance.

Only a very small percentage of Halifax citizens have realized the importance of the work that has been going on in that strip of land bounded by the Grafton Street Methodist Church, the Victoria Order of Nurses, Halifax Dispensary and other organizations interested in the new building were also present.

combined efforts will be an invaluable asset.

**Plan of Expansion.**

The building itself is being built with the \$250,000 given to the Medical College by the Rockefeller Foundation, but its maintenance will depend upon Dalhousie and will involve a very large annual expenditure, probably in the vicinity of \$15,000. It is placed in a quadrangle that will take in the whole property, leaving an open space in the centre to which access will be gained from the street by a large arch. This arch will correspond to another arch opposite, which will give access to another quadrangle, to be formed by a series of buildings, of which the medical science building is the first. This will place the Forrest building in the centre of the quadrangle. Of course it will take some time to achieve this objective, but it is an immense task to look forward to, and the present buildings have the added distinction of forming the nucleus of this splendid system.

The building for which the corner stone was laid yesterday faces on Morris street, and is 188 feet in length, while its width at Carleton street is 64 feet. The centre part of the building is three storey high and 96 feet

In length, the two wings on each side being two storeys high. The third storey of the main portion will be entirely given over to the quarters of the nine resident nurses, with a wing reserved for the maids. The plumbing arrangements of this floor are complete in themselves and separate from those of the rest of the building. There is a bathroom for each pair of nurses and a bedroom for the maids. There are also large sitting rooms for both.

**Premier's Speech.**

In the course of his remarks at the corner stone, Premier Murray said:

"The statistics for a period of ten years establishing to the establishment of our registration system show that of over one thousand babies born in this city each year, eighty-two died annually before reaching one year of age. Now that is a very high figure in some of the cities of the world. So I said, when certain proposals were placed before me by the Massachusetts-Halifax Health Commission, that if health conditions could be improved they were worthy of every support that the community could give, and should be encouraged. I now give the result of the efforts during the past two or three years, and instead of one hundred and eighty-two out of every thousand babies born in this city, we are today losing annually only thirty-seven out of every thousand. You will see the very great and direct benefit which has accrued to this community that has been done here during the past few years.

**Lowered Death Rate.**

"Figures are perhaps tiresome, but I would point out further that the general rate in this city was on the average over a period of ten years 20.2 per thousand. The average annual death rate for the past two years has been reduced to 14.3 per thousand. It is a very simple arithmetical problem for you to compute the number of lives that will be saved over a period of ten years if this ratio be maintained. That is worth something; it is worth a great deal. I am sure you will say, and credit is well due to those who have persistently struggled to achieve this end. I, therefore, think that this institution, becoming a health centre, as it will, for the whole of this city in the future, is a very important thing. It is the attitude which prevails in the Province, in an indirect way, is bound to occupy an important place in our affections and we will look upon it in years to come with great pride."

### COULD GET ALONG WITH LESS GOVERNMENT

(Canadian Finance)

When it is evident that a business is over-manned, that that business is owned by a joint stock company, the shareholders usually combine and demand a reduction in the staff. Such a demand involves a house-cleaning, and the management, very often with much reluctance, is compelled to dismiss trustworthy employees whose services are not required. Such a disagreeable task requires backbone on the part of the directors, and solid support from the shareholders. The shareholders who join in a demand for economy and the complaints because a particular friend of his has been dismissed as a result of the retrenchment he has demanded, would get little sympathy from a board of directors made up of business men who are not the friends of the man who is dismissed.

Now let us turn to our governments. We have nine provincial governments, one federal government, thousands of municipal and school administrations, with all the government machinery that such a large number of governing bodies requires—doing what? Administering the affairs of a population just about equal to that of London, England. Is there any wonder that our government is a mere chaos?

"The situation is with us, and a remedy must be found. It is admitted that many of our government departments—federal, provincial and municipal—are over-stuffed. One public man knows there are indications that they would like to put our government departments on a strictly business basis. But they have two conflicting forces to contend with. On the one hand there is the insistent public demand for economy. When our administration respond to this cry for economy
