W. V. B. Riddell, Ottawa, Dominion organizer for Boy Scouts Association, is a visitor in the city. Mr. Riddell announced this morning that a scout's camp will be held this summer at Grand Lake, on the St. John River (dates August 1st to 15th, inclusive). At this camp it is the intention of the officials of the Boy Scouts Movement to have experts in all branches of scout work address the boys, who, it was hoped, would have a representative present from every troop in the province.

At present in Moncton there are five troops, four of which are operative and one in course of organization. One pack of wolf cubs has also been organized here. In St. John city, sixteen troops are in operation, all of which are very active bodies. Six packs of wolf cubs have also been organized there and it is expected that in the month of May at least eight additional troops would be organized.
