



Punish Food Profiteers

(Montreal Herald.)

In Italy public patience has reached its limit with the food profiteers, mob violence has broken loose, and the mayor of Boston the president and four of the officers of the Bay State Fishing Company were tried and convicted of piling up millions of dollars of profits at the expense of fishermen and consumers through the instrumentality of the New England Fish Exchange, in which this company played a leading part. Shares of the exchange increased in value from \$100 to \$8,000. Exorbitant prices were exacted for fish of poor quality. So the other officials of the company were sentenced to one year in jail, and twelve of the five biggest packers, who were convicted of corruption, were sentenced to a fine, which would have been nothing to a wealthy company. The judge declared man, evidently thought that theft by a public corporation was just as much to be condemned as stealing by a private individual.

Now comes the startling report of the federal trade commission that the report of an approaching packer demotion of all important foods in the United States, and an investigation of the meat products through foreign companies, seems a certainty unless fundamental action is taken to prevent it. The report of the Federal Trade Commission is Part I of the commission's investigation of the meat industry, bearing on "Extent and Growth of Power of the Five Packers in Meat and Other Industries." This special report shows to what extent the "Big Five" of the meat packing industry are permeating the business of purveying all kinds of food. The "Big Five" are separately, now control 87 1/2 companies, have a minority in ninety-five others, and have what is called an "undetermined interest" in ninety-three more. The packers now deal in such various commodities as fresh tomatoes and ham strings, leather and cottonseed oil, grape juice, curdled milk, pepper, breakfast foods and washing powders. These branch houses are not only agents for the distribution of meat and poultry, but are wholesale grocery houses, and besides groceries they handle fertilizers, butter, eggs, rice, grains and countless other articles. The invasion has arrived with inundating force, and combined sales were above \$8,000,000,000 last year, and go up about a billion a year.

The Big Five have branch houses that are practically retail grocery stores; they conduct marketing and jobbing businesses. They control most of the services connected with the distribution of their output—such as cattle loan companies, transportation companies, and livestock trade papers. They are interested in banks, machinery, ice, salt, book-making. They deal in hides, oleomargarine, soap, glue, fertilizer and many other by-products. The list of things they buy and sell is too long to quote. They are reaching out, according to the report, for a control of most substitutes. The commission does not appear to be in a position to suggest a remedy for the protection of the public from this huge octopus which is so independent that it has refused to take back from the war department, where the food is spoiling, 75,000,000 pounds of bacon, 80,000 pounds of ham, 850,000,000 worth of canned meats and 100,000,000 worth of canned fruits.

A bill has been introduced in congress by Senator Kenyon in which it is proposed to end monopolies in foodstuffs by a system of licenses for the following purposes:

"To control and regulate the ownership and control of licenses over stock yards and to accomplish a divestiture of the packers' interests in the stock yards.

"To establish a control and to place a limitation upon the packers' interest in and control over foods, canned products other than meats, production and distribution of rice, breakfast foods and the wholesale and retail merchandising of these and other products unrelated to the packing industry.

"To place the refrigerator and other especially equipped cars for perishable products on a common carrier basis.

"To establish a permissive storage and market system which will enable the small packer or other dealer in food products to compete with the branch houses operated by the packers."

It is the business of public men who profess to be statesmen to provide a remedy for public ills. The report of the Federal Trade Commission will excite alarm no less in Canada than in the United States, as it is well known that the enormous activities of the Big Five penetrate this country equally with that of our neighbors across the border, and both governments should join issue at once with the powerful owners of the tentacles.


