## AIRPLANE FLIGHT TO SOUTH POLE

British Expedition to Start Next June; Will Use Air Route For Last 750 Miles of Journey

London, Sept. 1.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—John L. Cope, leader of the expedition to the South Pole to start next June, says his airplane flight to the Pole will be about 750 miles. The base from which the airplane will start is about that distance from the Pole. The airplane will be heavily loaded.

"We shall be compelled to take a sledge with us and extra provisions to enable us to return in case the airplane breaks down," said Mr. Cope. "Because of this additional weight it will be necessary to cut down our fuel to the minimum for taking off will be very difficult and it will be impossible to lift the machine for crossing the mountain ranges.

"We propose to set off with as much petrol as we can and then, half way on the outward journey just before we get to a range of mountains that we have to cross, to dump half of it and pick it up on the way back."

Families loaded their possessions onto carts or box-cars and took the road east. Every country road leading out was filled with these carts moving in caravans, leading cows and horses, often carrying pigs and fowls. It was not unusual to find a family of four or five crowded into a box-car with all their domestic animals and household goods, bound eastward with no fixed destination.

Practically no stocks of merchandise were moved. The railway machine shops were left intact as were factories of all sorts, no effort having been made to destroy them as would probably have been the case if evacuating to a foreign foe.

**Suspect Firebug.**  
Brantford, Sept. 29.—For the tenth consecutive night, the Brantford Fire Department was called out here early this evening. An incipient fire was found in the Heyd Block, a three storey building. The fire was started by someone pouring gasoline on the partition in the top story and then touching a match to the partition. It was caught just in time, owing to the fact that several lodges were in session and noticed the smoke. Late last night stacks of oats and hay on the water works farm property were touched off. At the time of the alarm the arrest of a vagrant on a back street attracted a crowd of two thousand persons around the police depot, it being thought that the firebug had been caught. The vagrant was let go in the Police Court this morning.

## G. W. V. A. LEADER WHO OPPOSES GRATUITY

Pertinent Queries by Branch President Who Does Not Regard \$2,000 For All as Equitable

Toronto newspapers are filled with letters on "soldiers' gratuities" these days. The following is an interview from the Toronto Telegram with a veteran's branch president, opposed to the \$2,000 grant.

"The G. W. V. A. is not half through with the government, or failing the government, with the public," said Parkdale President A. T. Hunter, K. C., when approached by the Telegram as to his opinion of the latest decision on returned soldiers' war gratuities. "The trouble has been that the crude stuff about \$2,000 has embarrassed our efforts," he continued. "The government was the last person who should have been handed such a proposition because the government knows better than any of us what a splendid cohort of crusty fellows were at some time or another in France. It was a poor inmate of Argyll House that could not hop over to Boulogne to qualify for the French ribbon."

People who cry "Great is Diana of the Ephesians" do not ultimately assist any cause. When we have tried to talk to any business man about the question of further aid to the returned soldier he has fastened on that proposition for \$2,000 for every man that was in France." Then he asks some questions: "\$2,000 for the man that was in France four years? \$2,000 for the man that was in France four days? \$2,000 for the colonel who took a seven days' Cook's tour? \$2,000 for the chap who stayed at Havre or Etaples? \$2,000 for the chap who stayed in the third Echelon? \$2,000 for the traitor that came after the armistice? And so forth.

"At Vancouver the G. W. V. A. grew up and discarded the \$2,000 stuff as you are aided. This War Gratuity League chum has picked up our milk tooth and tried to bite with it. Result, a sore gum.

## SAVED ROLLING STOCK FROM THE BOLSHIEVIKI

General Jack Tells of Evacuation of Perm and Adjacent Districts as Soviet Forces Advanced

Omsk, July 20, via Vladivostok, Aug. 12.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Ninety per cent of the railroad rolling stock in the Perm, Ekaterinburg and Shelabinsk districts was pulled out before the territory was given over to the Bolshievi, according to General Jack of the Inter-Allied technical committee, who assisted in the evacuation. Over 80,000 freight cars and approximately 600 locomotives were saved.

The railroad bridge over the Kama at Perm, 970 yards long, was put out of commission by the Siberian military before leaving. It is not so seriously damaged however, that it cannot be easily repaired. One complete span was dumped into the river.

The Kama fleet, thirty-nine vessels, several of which had been converted into gunboats, but later dismantled, was accidentally burned.


General Jack left Perm four hours before the Bolshievi shells began to fall in the town. With him came Otto T. Glaman, American vice consul, who had been asked by the Russian authorities to remain at his post as late as possible for the moral effect of his presence on the population during the days of evacuation. General Jack was loud in his praises of Glaman for valuable assistance rendered him in keeping trains moving.
