SAYS AMERICAN SOFT COAL TRADE IS DEMORALIZED

Washington, Dec. 27.—There has been an over-production of coal this year and a consequent struggle for trade, which depressed prices, is the opinion expressed today by Edward W. Parker, coal statistician for the United States Geological survey.

Mr. Parker added that there had been few more unsatisfactory years in the history of the coal mining industry, and that prices were depressed to such an extent that when the total returns for the year were footed up, the balance sheet would be on the wrong side of the ledger, although the production of coal in the United States for the year was probably second only to the record year of 1910.

DEFICIT OF GOVERNMENT ENORMOUS

Figures Show it is Nearer \$300,000 Than Amount Admitted

REVENUE VERY GREAT

Despite This, Expenditure Was Greater and Province Has Been Plunged Further Into Debt—A. B. Copp Criticizes Financial Statement

(Daily Telegraph). A deficit of more than \$250,000 is shown in the provincial finances for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31 of this year, according to the report of the auditor general which is given below. These figures are large, the largest in the recent history of the province, but they do not begin to tell the full story. A closer examination of the report reveals the fact that the actual deficit is in the vicinity of \$300,000 and in addition to this, there is an increase in the bonded indebtedness of the province of \$315,000.

Mr. Copp's Statement. A. B. Copp, M. P. P., the newly chosen leader of the New Brunswick opposition, who arrived in the city yesterday, pointed out the actual situation in an interview granted to a Telegraph reporter. "The very least that I can say of the report," said Mr. Copp, "is that in spite of the worst that we had feared, the actual figures are not only surprising but alarming."

"The government admits a deficit of \$250,000 on ordinary receipts and expenditures. Besides this we must take into account the first item of the report, which shows a balance of \$85,627.11, brought over from the previous year. This amount was added to their expenditures, bringing the actual deficit up to \$335,627.11. In addition to this an expenditure of \$102,763.26 on the New Brunswick and Railway Company is charged up to the capital account. It is impossible that such an amount could have been spent on permanent equipment and a large part of this amount should have been charged to current expenditures, which would have increased the deficit by that much more. "Another important matter to be borne in mind is the fact that the accounts do not include all the expenditures for the year. In accordance with his custom, the government has held over a large number of bills which should have been paid out of this year's revenue and, judging by the experience of other years, this would add something like \$100,000 to the deficit. An illustration of this is shown by the charge of \$448.74 on account of the expenses of the investigation into the Central Railway, which was held in 1908. Bills for this investigation have been held over ever since, and we have no assurance that there will be any more to come."

The More Surprising. "This tremendous deficit has been achieved in spite of the fact that the revenue of the province has increased largely. The \$300,000 larger; from memory, about \$100,000 larger; the revenue has increased by \$100,000, and the sources of revenue have been increased by \$100,000. The government has also increased its expenditures by \$100,000, and the result is that the deficit is \$300,000. It is also to be taken into consideration that the government has increased its bonded indebtedness by \$315,000 in the form of the addition to the dominion sub-

"An effort is made to excuse the deficit on the grounds that it was caused by heavy expenditures on public works. This expenditure might not be open to criticism if all the money had gone to improve the roads and bridges, but judging from this government's record in other years a large proportion of it went to the pockets of officials and others. It is also to be taken into consideration that the Conservative candidate, a reputation of the tactics adopted by the new government in 1908. "The territorial revenue has been increased, but this has been at the expense of the natural resources of the country. The stumpage collections have grown because the government reduced the size of saw logs, which the operators are allowed to cut. Apparently it considers the size of the collections more important than the preservation of the forests."

Startling Expenditures. "Although the expenditures have grown so rapidly, what department can show the benefits of the increase in the amount of money spent? None that I can see. It is to be regretted that the department of agriculture did not share more largely in larger disbursements. While the amount spent in this department is somewhat large, it is not nearly so large as the increase in the revenue of the province would warrant. "Altogether the showing made by the government is far from creditable. Its greatest achievement has been to roll up a deficit of such tremendous proportions as to completely dwarf any deficit of any previous government."

A. B. COPP IS NEW LEADER

Liberals in Convention Place Him at Head of Provincial Opposition

REPRESENTATIVE GATHERING

Hon. Mr. Robinson Resigns and First Lieutenant is Chosen to Succeed Him—Tributes by Prominent Men of Party

The resignation of Hon. C. W. Robinson, leader of the provincial opposition, the selection of A. B. Copp, M. P. P., as his successor and the announcement that the annual convention of the Liberal party will be held on a date to be fixed by the new leader.

He expressed the keenest regret at Mr. Robinson's retirement, and would have been content to remain upon the firing line and given any other choice his hearty assistance. Since he had been chosen, he thanked them heartily for the great honor and would do all in his power to deserve it.

A resolution was moved by Hon. Mr. Robinson, seconded by Mr. Copp, and unanimously carried, expressing the keenest appreciation of the services of Hon. Mr. Robinson as leader of the party while premier and in opposition and regret at his retirement.

It was decided that a convention of the Liberal party and those opposed to the local government should be held in the near future on a date to be fixed by the new leader.
