A LIVE SNAKE IN A WOMAN'S ARM. A most remarkable affliction, and one of a nature calculated to make one's flesh creep, has long been endured by an old lady of the Willoby neighborhood, near Columbia, S. C. The lady's name is Phoebe Brown, and for more than one-third of a century she has carried a live snake under the skin of one of her arms. How the reptile found lodgment in such a peculiar place is as much of a mystery to Mrs. Brown as it is to the hundreds of people who annually visit her for the purpose of viewing the spot where the unwelcome lodger lies encysted. When the lady first noticed the bow shaped welt on her arm, it was not more than two inches long or larger in diameter than a pin. But during the years that it has safely nestled in her flesh, absorbing the woman's blood, it has grown from a mere thread to be a snake more than a foot in length and as large as a lead pencil. The eyes of the hideous creature are plainly visible through the woman's skin, and the scales can be easily felt by rubbing the fingers along the ridge formed by the serpent's body.
