

John Banello, Married Only a Few Hours,

Charged With Fatally Wounding

SOUTH FRANKLIN, May 7.—The police have been unable to locate John Banelio, who is alleged to have shot his bride of a night, Frances Banelio, at their newly prepared home Sunday night. The young bride was still allve at midnight but little hope is entertained for her recovery. The couple were married Sunday and received friends in their new home until nearly midnight when they retired, Mr. Banelio, the groom's father, who occupied the room upstairs being the only other occupant of the house with them. Early yesterday he was aroused by hearing revolver shots down stairs, and hurrying down to the couple's room he found the young woman lying on the bed with three bullet wounds and three stab wounds in her body. The husband had disappeared.
