GOVERNMENT MUST CONSENT FOR C.P.R. TO DROP ST. JOHN

Company Holds Sub-Contract from Allans, Says Mr. Pugsley, Under Which Mail Steamers Must Call at This Port--No Reason to Think Change Would be Permitted.

Hon. William Pugsley left last evening for Montreal on a brief business trip and will return to the city on Thursday. When asked by The Standard as to the possibility of the C. P. R. Empress steamers stopping at Halifax next season instead of continuing their voyages to this port, he said that before the company could take any such action it would be obliged to secure the permission of the government.

He, he replied: "I have heard nothing as to the matter except what the press have published."

In reference to the work in Courtenay Bay the minister said there was nothing new. The engineers under H. M. Davy had commenced borings to determine the general layout of the terminals and particularly the location of the dry dock.

Will hold inquest on Mrs. Emma Hooper. Jury empanelled last evening in case of woman who died under mysterious circumstances--Postmortem held.

Dr. D. E. Berryman, the coroner, will hold an inquest on Tuesday evening into the cause of the death of Mrs. Emma Hooper, who arrived in the city on Wednesday last, and who had been under treatment in the general public hospital until Monday evening when her death occurred.

The deceased woman, Mrs. Hooper, arrived in the city last Wednesday and registered at the Dufferin under another name. The following morning she was found in her room in an apparent stupor, with a gas upon her wrist.
