DALHOUSIE FUND

ALMOST COMPLETE, MORE WANTED NOW

The Campaign Closes \$10,000 Short of the Mark and Total is Raised to Five Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Halifax, June 10.—The campaign to raise \$400,000 for Dalhousie University, of which Halifax citizens were asked to subscribe \$200,000, closed to night. It was found that Halifax had given \$100,000 and places outside the city also \$100,000, making a total to date of \$200,000. Among the largest subscriptions today were \$2,500 each from the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Royal Bank of Canada. Sir Fred. Gordon, ex-minister of militia, gave \$5,000 on condition that a like amount is raised in Kings county where he resides. This will be done and in that case the whole \$400,000 will be received. The meeting of 100 workers tonight agreed to advance the total aimed at to \$500,000 and steps will be taken to secure this amount without delay in this province and elsewhere in Canada. There was great rejoicing among the Dalhousie workers when the final results were announced. The team headed by Hon. A. K. MacLean, M. P., raised the largest amount, having \$40,340 to its credit.
