SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS. Any person who is the sole holder of a family or any man over 18 years of age, has been a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must ap- pear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.

Duties—See monthly residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years, a homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of 160 acres, or on a smaller acreage and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter or brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may exempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead, or on a portion thereof, for a period of six years from date of homestead en- try, counting the time from the date of homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre- servation may enter for a purchased home- stead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.
