DANISH SETTLERS FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Campaign Carried Out in Denmark during past Summer Expected to Produce Results After the War.

The provincial immigration department have been prosecuting a progressive and aggressive campaign in Denmark the past summer looking toward obtaining a large number of farmers from that country after the war, and according to reports received from that country their expectation will be more than realized.

C. C. Meyer, Danish consul-general at Ottawa, has spent the summer in Denmark, and in addition to a number of lectures delivered on the advantages of New Brunswick has distributed 10,000 leaflets where he thought they would do the most good.

In a letter which was received yesterday from him by Mr. Gilchrist, superintendent of immigration, he stated that prospects were exceedingly bright for a large number of farmers leaving that country and settling in New Brunswick, as they were satisfied from what he had told them, and also from the reports which had been sent home by some who were already settled here that New Brunswick was a good place in which to live.

Mr. Meyer asked to have 10,000 more leaflets forwarded to him for distribution, and Mr. Gilchrist has already ordered them and they will be forwarded in a few days.

Mr. Gilchrist said that the Danes were among the best immigrants we could have, one reason being that nearly all of them settled on the land instead of staying in the cities. They were practical farmers, and all who had been placed by the Farm Settlement Board as yet were more than satisfied with the treatment they had received.

CAPT. CORBETT HAS RETURNED FROM ENGLAND

Popular St. John Officer Arrived Home Last Night—Tells of Work Among the Wounded Soldiers in Hospital.

Among the passengers which the Scandinavian brought to Halifax was Captain G. G. Corbett, who is to command the New Brunswick Ambulance Depot, now being recruited in the city. Captain Corbett arrived in the city last night. In conversation with The Standard Captain Corbett said he had been stationed at the Canadian Convalescent Hospital, Bearwood, Wokingham. This magnificent building was formerly the residence of Mr. Waters of the London Times, and required one hundred servants to operate it. Captain Corbett said he had met several New Brunswick boys in the course of his professional duties in the hospital, among whom were several from St. John. The only two he could call to mind were Privates Stone and Brewer. The latter is returning to Canada to take a commission in the Killie Battalion.

"After a man has been wounded," said the captain, "he is carried back to the base hospital at the rear of the firing line. From there he is removed either to a French or British hospital, should he be removed to England he is admitted to the General Hospital, and after his wounds have healed enough to permit him to walk, he is removed to the Convalescent Hospital. Here he is given slight physical drills and exercises which are in accordance with the food and care of the soldiers the captain said that the boys were getting the best of food and were well looked after, receiving the very best of attention from the medical officers and nursing sisters, in the three hospitals.

"Colonel MacLaren and Mrs. MacLaren, wished to be remembered to all the people in St. John," said the captain. And he continued, "the people of St. John should feel proud to think that Colonel MacLaren is holding the next to General Jones, the highest position in the Canadian Army Medical Corps in England."

Captain Corbett also met Captain A. McMillan, of the 26th, who wished to be remembered to the people of St. John. It is not known officially what rank Captain Corbett will have as officer commanding the No. 8 Field Ambulance Depot, but he will probably be given a majority. This unit will proceed to France as a separate unit, and with the exception of the Kingston Field Ambulance, the highest position in the Canadian Army Medical Corps in England."

The funeral of Mrs. Christina Vanwart took place at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Centenary church. Rev. W. H. Barron officiated at the church and grave. Interment was at Fernhill. The pall-bearers were Capt. Murray McNaughton, 6th Battery, C. F. A., cousin of the deceased, and William, Arthur and Frederick Bowman, cousins of Mrs. Murray. Among the mourners were G. Hunsicker, of Montreal; T. A. Marven, of Moncton, and T. W. McLaughlin of Sackville. A large number of floral emblems was received, amongst them being wreaths from Hibernia Lodge, No. 3 F. and A. M., the Fortnightly Club, Barristers' Society and the St. John Art Club. All these organizations were represented in a very large and sympathetic cortege of mourners.
