

THE WEATHER

Toronto, Feb. 19.—A moderate depression which was over British Columbia on Saturday morning has moved quickly with increasing energy to the Great Lakes where it is now situated, causing showers and thunderstorms in the north and portions of Ontario and light showers in the western portions. Showers in the Dominion, with the exception of some snow or rain in the Maritime Provinces, the weather has been fair.

Forecast. Maritime—Storm winds and moderate rain, southerly to westerly, with rain. Northern—New England—Rain or snow in early morning followed by fair weather Monday; Tuesday fair and calm. Frost and probably strong south and southwest winds.

Able Address On Temperance Topic

Rev. Neil MacLaughlin in Queen Square Methodist Church Gives Plain Facts on the Matter.

The large congregation, which attended the morning service at the Queen Square Methodist church yesterday, listened with avid interest to a strong and forcible address, delivered by the pastor, Rev. Neil MacLaughlin, who took as his subject, "The Plain Facts in Regard to the Temperance Situation." The speaker dealt very largely with the lack of enforcement of the prohibition act; the duties of the police authorities; the duties of the courts; the duties of the legislature; the duties of the people; and the duties of the church.

Rev. Neil MacLaughlin, in the course of his remarks, spoke of the interest in the time to which the temperance provinces had come in regard to the temperance question, and of the great amount of interest and suspense with which they were waiting for the time to come when the act declaring the prohibition of importation would become law.
