The Sovernment of this colony has hitherto had no definite or tangible policy with regard to the native Indian tribes. They have preserved for them brown lands, under the name of Indian Reserves; they have prevented their land being incroached whon; they have in existence a figure Paw, with hinal clauses stringent and severe, but honoured more in. the breach than in observance Beyond this they have done nothing, so fai as I know There does not exist an Indian hospital in the colony to ameliaate the evilo which contact with a too advanced stage of civilization has

There may be insuficiable abotacles in the way of any definite policy of preservation and development being adopted. I am bound to suppose that ouch abstacles do exist; otherwise, such negligence would make the very stones
