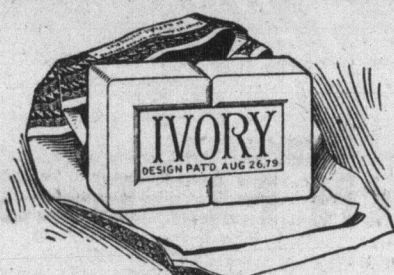

Submits Plan
For World's League

COMPRISES 66 ARTICLES IN-
CLUDING DISARMAMENT

Paris May 13—The German plan
for a league of nations submitted by
the German delegation at Versailles
and now in the hands of the peace con-
ference committee on the league of

nations to which it was referred con-
tains 66 articles, together with a supple-
ment setting forth the charter for an
international labor league. The special
aims of the league are set forth as follows:

(a) Prevention of international dis-
putes.

(b) Disarmament.

(c) Securing freedom of traffic and
general economic equality of rights.

(d) Protection of National minor-
ities.

(e) Creation of an international
workers' charter.

(f) Regulation of colonial questions.

(g) Unity of existing and future in-
ternational institutions.

Another provision of the draft reads:
"The league of nations shall com-
prise: (a) all belligerent states taking
part in the present war; (b) high neutral
states included in "The Hague" arbitra-
tion league; (c) all others to be admit-
ted by vote of two-thirds of the exist-
ing members. Entrance is reserved to the
Holy See."

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Canadian Flag
is Suggested

QUEBEC MEMBER BELIEVES IT
WOULD HELP SPIRIT IN
CANADA

Ottawa May 13—The adoption of
a Canadian national flag was strongly
urged by Mr. A.B. MacMaster to-
night in the House.

He pointed out that both Australia
and New Zealand had their own na-
tional flags. He believed such a step
by Canada would help to create a
sound national spirit. It was a matter
which deserved public attention.

Hon. W.S. Fielding said that there
was often used improperly the red
design with the arms of Canada on the
field. This was purely a maine flag.
Mr. Carvell expressed no opinion on
the subject.

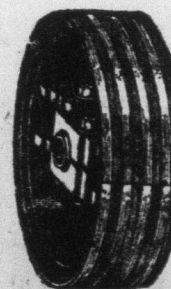
