NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN
INFANT CASE.

Medical opinion as arrived at
in the post mortem examination
of the body of the babe found at
the corner of Ahrens and Vetoia is
streets last Saturday morning is
that the infant lived from one quar-
ter of an hour to one hour after
birth and that it met its death by
asphyxiation or strangulation.
The coroner's jury met yesterday
afternoon at Coroner Dr. F.H. Kalb-
fleisch presiding. Mr. E.A. Thamer
was elected foreman. The jury
first proceeded to the undertaking
establishment where they viewed
the remains. After returning to
the old Council Chamber the evi-
dence of Dr. Ed. Hagmeister, who
performed the post-mortem, was
heard. He went over the special
legal forms embodying the post
mortem report. The sum and sub-
stance of this report is that there
had been respiration. As to how
long he thought the body had been
there or how long it had been dead
Dr. Hagmeister could not state owing
to the fact that the body had been
subjected to great changes in tem-
perature. However, he did state
that he thought the time
might have been from two days to
one week or so.

Mr. Barney Joseph of 257 Vic-
toria Street, who found the body,
Mr. Robert Jackson, who was cal-
led by him while passing the prop-
erty and Chief O'Neill also testi-
fied regarding the discovery. Mr.
Joseph stated that while he was
passing he had his head bent down
wards owing to the snow. It was
then that his eye noticed a parcel
under the verandah about three
feet from the sidewalk. The shape
and size of the parcel appeared sus-
picious to him and he touched but
did not open it although he was
sure of what it was a babe. He
drew the attention of Mr. Jackson
who was passing and then it was
ascertained that it was the body
of an infant.

This evidence was corroborated
by Mr. Jackson. D.S. Bowlby
acted for the Crown. At his sug-
gestion the inquest was adjourned
for a week. The date was not fa-
vorable for one of the jurymen and
the day was fixed as Wednesday
Feb. 26th.
