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PRIESTS WERE DUPED

New York, Feb. 24.—District Attorney Krotel said today that the parish books of the Roman Catholic churches in the neighborhood, known as "Little Italy," will figure largely in future developments in his investigations of the Italian insurance fraud cases. He said that the records of the Catholic churches will show that the priests have been the victims of conspirators as well as the insurance companies, and have been duped into administering the rites of the church to persons whose real identity was other than the priest had been led to believe. In one or two instances he has found evidence that a priest has unwittingly given a certificate for burial in Calvary cemetery in the name of a man or woman not yet dead.
