I do not feel myself condemned as yet; but the insinuation thrown out, of the probability of guilt, and my name held up to public notice, as demanding public investigation, cannot but create a strong bias in the public mind to my disadvantage. Upon that ground I feel myself most severely, and most unjustly prejudged. I stand ready to be heard. I demand to be heard in my defence; and I am confident I can convince even the Committee, that I have been unjustly treated by their Report.

Having said this much, I will rest satisfied to wait the time when I may shew my conduct in a different light from that exhibited by the Deputies, Viger, Neilson, and Cuvillier.

Anxious to meet investigation, I earnestly beg to be informed in what manner, shape, or form, it is intended to be made. I am ready to meet it in any shape.
