that in some measure seemed to meet the requirements, but only at the sacrifice of much of the strength of the book. To preserve this and at the same time to secure the necessary freedom of opening was the difficulty. This at last has been overcome, and the largest blank-books are now bound by Messrs. Warwick Bro's & Rutter by a process that not only ensures a satisfactory flat opening, but at the same time adds

strength and firmness to the binding. Although the invention is covered by patent, its use adds but an insignificant amount to the cost of the book.

A newly made blank-book should be handled with care. The sewing, gluing and moing are likely to be hard and inflexible, and the spring-back, which is full of life and vitality, holds the edges with a firm grip. To force the book open at the centre will likely result in breaking the back or

the artisans' skill.
