FINE EXHIBIT AT AUSTIN'S

Magnificent Millinery Display at the Big Bargain Centre.

Many Delightful Attractions Viewed by Planet Representative on his Visit.

Yesterday was opening day at one of Chatham's favorite shopping places, The Bargain Centre, and the various departments of this popular establishment were at their best. It is rarely one has the pleasure of viewing such a magnificent and well assorted stock as Mr. Austin has gathered together from the famous marts of the world. Upstairs in the beautiful millinery reception rooms were some of Chatham's fairest matrons and maids, attracted by the display of handsome millinery. Hats from the famous Parisian makers were to be seen. World-renowned artists have sent their daintiest conceptions such as would delight the heart of a fairy and which brought forth many expressions of praise from the ladies present.

Shaggy materials are the smart novelties for hat making foundations. Shaggy long haired felt for trimming is also much used and among the finer materials velvets will be to the front—pauze, cross mirror and plain velvets in a variety of colors. Persian effects in velvet will also be quite smart. A novelty material for making and trimming is marbled marlines and marbled cloth in soft dainty shades, as well as black and white effects, which will be very fashionable. Shapes will be low and broad us heretofore. Broad toques and low hats, ostrich feathers, birds, braids pompons and wings promise to be much worn. Ornaments are very beautiful the round cabouchon being very modish. Jet rhinestone, gilt, steel and old silver buckles will all be worn, the latter being decidedly different to anything that has been used in former seasons. Prevailing colors are grey, fawns, greens, blues, also green and blue mixtures and black and white, nickel grey being one of the latest. Among the most popular shades are the gainsborough and the tricolor, while the florodora and amazon plateau hats still remain in fashion.

In ready-to-wear hats the variety of shapes is very great and the range of trimmings inexhaustible. Among the hats which attracted the largest share of attention was a large Dutchess of Devonshire. This is a very beautiful hat with a large shape with six large ostrich feathers drooping towards the front. It is trimmed with black silk lace and tulle with a high band and void of trimmings underneath with the exception of a steel band.

Another was a large brown velvet plaque made of tulle and shirred velvet drooping in front and flaring at the side. Trimmed with feathers of the same shade with a large bow of fringed satin at the back. The band also is trimmed with feathers and buckles.

Another very pretty creation was a mink turban, the rim made of brown shirred velvet and the crown of cream velvet and tulle. Mink forms the side trimmings and is caught at the back with a steel buckle.

A great favorite was a large toque draped on the brim with green velvet and angora tulle. It is made with a blue feather crown and a breast effect for a side trimming.

Another much admired one was a port-hole castor colored tailored hat, turban shaped, with a brim of Thine stitched ruffled velvet. The crown is made of folds of white camel's hair trimmed with taffeta ribbon and quill.

The other departments in the store are worth more than a passing mention. Their lines in dress goods, staples, small and fancy weaves, art muslins, furs, silks and gents' furnishings is very complete and contains all the latest novelties and up-to-date and fashionable goods. Above the staple departments is an elaborate display of embroidered linens.

CAPTIVATING CREATIONS

Marvel in Millinery on Exhibition at Miss Cuckley's.

Many Charming Accomplishments of Deft Designers Noted in Brief Visit.

At Miss Cuckley's splendid show rooms the millinery opening was very successful. The trimmed hats were very prettily made up while the ready-to-wears, are of the latest and most pleasing designs.

Among the trimmed hats is to be seen a castor and brown formed in strips of castor felt. The under brim of castor, is ornamented by straps of velvet, held by steel cabouchons. Drapery of brown velvet and a handsome quill effect finish the garniture.

Another of the very pretty ones is Marquise Trianon of tan silk and beige velvet. The brim outline is made of new, crush silk and velvet, and crown of Angora. Wide black velvet bands and strass ornaments adorn the side and back.

Another of these beautiful trimmed hats is a tan crown, chenille trimmed, with large knotted rose silk and black plumes with loops of black ribbon velvet.

Still another of the beautiful creations to be seen here is a grey, Gainsborough, trimmed with white and grey velvet, with beautiful tips and buckles.

Among the others are a black Gainsborough, an Amazon, a Marie Antoinette, a black Neapolitan and others too numerous to mention.

The new style Newbury hats, with a crown higher at the back than at the front, in all colors, are to be seen here. Pauze velvet and silk in the Dresden patterns in all shades will be largely used this season. Long feathers and tips are to be very stylish this year. Bristles in all sizes and colors will be worn—a good deal as well as sea-gulls of all sizes, and, of course, other birds will be worn.

DEVOTEES OF DAME FASHION

Foreman's Grand Millinery Display now at its B st.

The Planet Man's interesting interview—Gains Some idea of what will be worn During this Season.

A passerby on King street cannot help but be attracted by the beautiful display of millinery made in Foreman's window. An artist has been at work here, and the effect is a most creditable one. The display however, is only an idea of the wonderful richness of the showing inside. If one is attracted by the window, they cannot help but be charmed when they enter the millinery show-room of this establishment. Everything is very tastefully gotten up and arranged with such skill as to meet the admiration of all who view it. The competent head milliner and her able assistants have really outdone themselves this year in their efforts to suit the demands of their ever growing patronage. Last year it was thought that the limit was reached in the fine display of millinery art, but each year brings forth new ideas, and new patterns, which are simply irresistible.

This season more than any other, sees so many new ideas carried out with such charming results. The prevailing colors will be watercolor green and verdigians, made in every tint and wood shades up to fawn, browns, browns, pearl grey turquoise blue, old rose and castor, black and black and white more, more than any other color predominates. The shapes are in many styles of the Gainsborough and many large effects. Toques tilted on one side or both, with sweeping breasts and plumes, also birds. Antique lace is very largely used, and soft liberty silks. Chenille in jet and steel squared passmenteries, panne velvets in plain and Parisian effects are favorites. Much stitching and solid shirring is used also the overlapping frills.

Tips formed the brim of a large black velvet picture hat, faced in with gold and cream applique chiffon, two very handsome black plumes sweeping about the left side to the back. The tilts decidedly to the left. From the boudeau, decorated with a mass of loops of rich black ribbon and a Rhinestone cabouchon. Much admired was a grey toque in two shades of a panne velvet, trimmed with steel and chenille passmenteries over old rose liberty silk. Velvet straps attached and caught at back with steel ornaments.

A particularly handsome mink toque had a soft angora crown with antique lace over rose liberty silk, tilted high on both sides, with a broad band of mink. The crown comes over and is caught at the side with Rhinestone crescent.

One stand of large black hats makes a very fine showing. Among the sold are two for Detroit, one for St. Paul, Minn. and one for Montreal.
