Fewer Rejected Ballots.

Fewer Rejected Ballots.

Ottawa, April 15.—In the last Dominion election there were less rejected ballots than ever before. There is not a constituency in Canada where individual voters did not purposely mark ballots for more than one candidate, the idea being to keep promises made to rival candidates. When an allowance is made for these cases the probability is that the number of ballots accidentally spoiled is very small, indeed. The rejected ballots in November last numbered 6,090 out of a total vote of 1,036,185 throughout the Dominion, in 1900 there were 7,718 out of a total vote of \$52,496, and in 1898 13,871 out of a total vote of \$53,560. The diminution, therefore, represents over 20 per cent over the record of the preceding general election.
