AN OUTSIDE OPINION.

That the launching of the Games charges in the solemn and circummantial manner adopted by the ac cuser was a severe blow to the repatation of the Province of On-tario, cannot be questioned. View-ed in the most favorable light, it was a bad business. But bad as it was it was in the power of the impeached Ministers to take a long step towards the re-establishment of our reputation, as a moral, justice-loving community by inviting the speediest and most searching inquiry into the charges. That course, for obvious reasons, they refused to take. Hence we are treated to comments like the following from the Detroit

"Despite the usually justifiable boast that Canadian justice is swift and sure, the method of procedure in this case impresses American judgment unfavorably. American methods of dispensing justice are supposed to be loose; but when a legislator or other public official is charged with giving or receiving a bribe, judicial authority is at once involved, and its processes followed until the case is determined. No such step has been taken in dealing with the Gamey scandal, though Stratton and those associated with him can be sent to the penitentiary for fourteen years if guilty. There is no question as to the right of a legislative body to investigate the alleged wrongs of its own members or of a criminal attempt to influence one of them to violate his official integrity But this does not preclude the right and duty of seeking to punish the crime charged through the courts.

"To the American view the whole proceeding thus far, as conducted by the party in power, seems farcical. It has stacked the cards while solemnly insisting that it desires nothing but a fair deal. Acting as a grand jury, it is framing the indictment against Stratton, and will ap point the commission to try him. "In other words the prosecutors are

to prosecute themselves before a tribunal of their own naming, and identified with the Government, which is trying to clear his skirts Stratton is not the only one accused and to acquit him is a shield for everybody implicated. In addition to all this, the Legislature is to be suspended during the so-called investigation, so that there can be no supervision by the people through their direct representatives. The acquittal thus foreshadowed would go far toward heading off a trial for the crime of bribery and the Government could point to the vindication of a Scotch verdict."
