There has been some infantry activity along the front in France held by the British forces, but along the rest of the front only the artillery and aerial arms have been the means of attack by the opposing forces. Artillery bombardment has been violent both east and west of the Meuse. In the Verdun region, east of the Meuse, the Germans shelled the French positions between Cote du Poivre and Douaumont. French airmen have shelled German stations and the Germans have retaliated by attacks in the Verdun sector.

German aeroplanes have dropped bombs on the Russian battleship Slava in the Gulf of Riga. Berlin reports the action had good results. The Teutons also have attacked Russian warehouses at Rjazyea with airships.

The reports of activities on the Austro-Italian line and on the Russo-Turkish front in Asia Minor relate no important actions.
