Interesting Letter of
Doings at Valcartier

Valcartier Camp, Sept. 8, 1914.

Editor of the Courier:
Sir,—I did not think it would
come amiss to send you a few lines
briefly outlining the existing condi-
tions at Valcartier Camp.

At the present time I am attached
to the 21st Essex Regiment of Wind-
sor, which after to-day will be known
as the 1st Ontario. This outfit, as
in the case of many others, contains
many men who have never seen ser-
vice before, and at the beginning
their knowledge of drill and military
life was extremely crude, but these
defects are rapidly being overcome,
and with amazing rapidity they are
being whipped into excellent form.

To one who has not visited the
camp it is impossible to believe that
one month ago it was a vast farm
tract devoted entirely to the raising
of crops. Now it is a city of tents,
with a population of over 40,000 men,
with more arriving each day. The
camp boasts of two excellent Boul-
evards, known as Boulevard Canteen
and Boulevard Main. The former
consists entirely of wooden shacks
where one is enabled to purchase any-
thing from sealing wax to battleships,
and, take it from me, they are do-
ing an excellent business, at prices
that reach to the roof. An ordinary
candle light your change pocket for a
dime; while an apple that could sell
refuge behind one's wisdom tooth.

At night the place is brilliantly
lighted by electricity, and the engi-
neer corps have put in busy hours mak-
ing roadways. The sanitary system
is excellent, and as yet not one case
of fever has been reported.

dislike and that is inoculation. The
medical staff of the camp are mak-
ing preparations for and in some
cases have commenced the second in-
oculation process, and the second
dose should not be deferred over 12
days after the first injection. It is a
pretty severe test on one's physical
condition, and many of the officers
and boys are confined to their tents,
but the worst is over in twenty-four
hours.

with the boys. They are not al-
lowed to go to Quebec, which is 16
miles distant, only on pass for mat-
ters of importance such as dental
treatment, etc.; but Mr. Best gets
anything they want, and he sure has
a load when he arrives in camp each
morning. He was also instrumental
in having a picture machine instal-
led with a change of pictures each night.
The immense parade ground is pack-
ed at every performance and the en-
tertainment greatly appreciated.

Give my best regards to the boys
as I must go to my chief duty now,
—the mess bugle has sounded.
