DEAFNESS IS RESULTING TO MANY OFFICERS Artillery Fire Having Effect on the Army—To Investigate Cure. [By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Dec. 29.—The announcement that the British government is appointing an emergency committee to consider measures for the prevention of gun deafness among soldiers and sailors calls attention to an added terror of war which has been much discussed recently in military and medical circles.
