HAS MADE NO IMPROVEMENT (Courier Leased Wire)

LONDON, Jan. 6.—"Man has shown no improvement either in intellect or morals from the days of the earliest Egyptians and Syrians down to the keel-laying of the latest Dreadnought," according to a survey which Dr. Alfred Russel Wallace, known as the grand old man of science, has completed on the eve of his 80th birthday next Wednesday. In his survey in "The Daily News" today he declares that for 7,000 years morals and intellect have been stationary. "There has been of course, a great accumulation of human knowledge, but for all that we are no cleverer than the ancients," he declared. "There is still most abominable vice going on every kind of cruelty to the poor and children, adulteration everywhere in every commodity and lies everywhere. The average of mankind will remain the same until natural selection steps in to raise it." Dr. Wallace qualifies his gloomy remarks with the belief that there is no cause for worry for the future, however, as "the outlook is hopeful."

SERIOUS CHARGES

In Connection With Aviation Machines--It is Alleged That Some Were Tampered With to Cause Murder in the Air.

(Courier Leased Wire).
NEW YORK, Jan 6—A cable from London to The Tribune says: The Royal Aero Club is investigating what The Daily Express says is probably the first attempt at murder in mid-air, Lawrence Santoni, managing director of the British Dependable Aeroplane Company, has published allegations of the gravest nature. He states that on three separate occasions attempts have been made to damage the engines of certain military aeroplanes that they would break down while in flight. The outrages, he says, were obviously the work of experts, who they were how they obtained entrance to the machines for long enough to tamper with them, and what their motives were, whether animosity against particular pilots or possible passengers, the jealousy of particular aeroplane makers or possibly a settled design against the British army of the air are questions which will have to be thrashed out by the Royal Aero Club and possibly by the police.

HYDRO

Wins Out in Municipal Election
People Know When

TORONTO, Jan. 7.—Voting in Hydro-Electric by-laws in the vicine of Ontario no longer can an element of doubt. The success of the people's power system has been so convincing that it is remarkable that the submission of power by law to the people for approval has come to be something formal procedure. The result is interesting from the point of view how little opposition there is to municipal power.

Returns were received yesterday from fourteen municipalities that had voted upon power by law, and in every one the system that Hon. Adam B. and his colleagues on the Hydro Electric Power Commission built up was endorsed in strict fashion. In some municipalities opposition was expressed in but four or five votes, while in Peterborough the private power interest has been well entrenched for years the majority in favor of Hydro-Electric was in the neighborhood of 500.
